



## On This Date in Nativity History 30 June 1973

On this date, Nativity celebrated its first wedding; Father Frank Ready was the celebrant. Married that day were Sheldon Wright Chaplin, Jr., 22, of Springfield, Virginia, the son of Sheldon and Mary (Normandin) Chaplin, and Victoria Louise Munz, 20, of Albuquerque, New Mexico, the daughter of Clarence Stewart and Eleanor (Funck) Munz. In these early days, wedding Masses were celebrated at St. Mary's Historic Church. From that date to mid-July 2022, Nativity has celebrated 1,360 weddings. Below is the marriage certificate; Father Ready's signature appears at the bottom.

#### Dear parishioners,

On January 2, 2023 we began the sanctuary renovation of our church as part of our parish 50th Anniversary celebration. A large screen was erected to cover the sanctuary area during the renovation. A temporary altar and tabernacle has been placed in front of the screen for our prayer and worship. Daily and Sunday Mass will continue to be celebrated in the church. The renovation is scheduled to be completed by March 11, 2023.

#### WHAT ARE WE RENOVATING?

THE SANCTUARY FLOOR: The current sanctuary floor is chipped and stained and cannot be restored. There is also an electrical outlet coming out of the steps with red tape as a caution to all. The new sanctuary floor will be a cream color marble floor with border inlets that will enhance the beauty and safety of the altar area.

THE ALTAR: The altar, on which is effected the Sacrifice of the Cross made present under sacramental signs, is also the table of the Lord to which the People of God gather to participate in the Mass, and it also is the center of the thanksgiving that is accomplished through the Eucharist. In every church there should be a fixed altar. The current altar of wood and stone does not line up with the center aisle and has electrical outlets coming out of it in the back. Since we are now going to have a marble floor, the new altar will be built with a dignified cherry stain wood and marble inlets to coordinate with the new marble floor. It will contain relics of various saints.

THE AMBO: The current ambo (pulpit) will be replaced by a cherry wood stain and marble ambo. The design of the new ambo will match the altar as a way of expressing the unity of the Word of God in the Scripture and the Word of God in the Eucharist. There is also a practical motivation for the design of the new pulpit. The current ambo provides little room for the lectionary and homily notes. We also must carry a step stool to the ambo when our children are reading. The renovated ambo will have a shelf for liturgical books and a step installed that can be pulled out when needed by a lector.

THE TABERNACLE: A principal feature of the renovation is the moving of the tabernacle to the center of the sanctuary underneath the Crucifix. This design placement calls attention to the centrality of the Eucharist in our faith. As Pope John Paull II said, "We are the Church of the Eucharist." Visually when you walk into the church, your eyes will be drawn to the Altar, Tabernacle and Crucifix in unity on the same axis in the center. These liturgical sacred items will be architecturally what they are spiritually, the axis of our lives.

<u>PRESIDERS CHAIR:</u> Another liturgical change after the Second Vatican Council was the use of the Presiders Chair for the principal prayers of the Mass. As such, we have designed a chair that fits the overall design of the sanctuary. It will be placed on the side wall where the current tabernacle is located. New chairs for the deacon and alter servers are being made. The current chairs are over 30 years old, have served us well, but are in need of an upgrade.

MOSAIC PANELS: We are adding seven mosaic panels on the right side of the church behind the choir section to echo the seven stained glass windows on the left. These mosaic panels will depict the Seven Corporal Works of Mercy, beautifully displaying Christ's command to care for those in need, a charism of Nativity parish. This will highlight the scripture from Matthew 25 when Jesus describes how we will be judged. It will be a teaching reminder to any who say: "If its not on the final exam, I don't want to study it." Pope Francis has called us "to be a church for the poor." These seven mosaics will also provide a balance visually in the church.... and in our lives.

The cost of this renovation is \$640,000. To date, through the generosity of parishioners, we have raised over half that amount. More are considering a pledge or using our monthly building envelope. If you would like to help contribute, please go to our parish website or call the parish office.

## KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS - APPALACHIA HOME BUILDING SPECIAL COLLECTION - JANUARY 21/22

This Weekend, the Knights will be speaking at all the Masses asking for your help to continue their home building effort in one of the poorest counties in our country. For the last 22 years, the Nativity Knights and Nativity Parish have partnered with the Appalachian Construction Crew operating out of Bellevue, Nebraska, to build one or two homes in McCreary County, Kentucky, which is rated as one of the top counties in this country for income below the poverty level. Throughout the year both crews raise money to offset the normal cost of approximately \$82,000 to build the home. Last year, because of the COVID impact on the supply chain and the three-bedroom home, our costs exceeded \$102,000. With the generosity of Nativity Parish, Nativity has raised over \$90,000 in past collections and is the main funding source for the annual home building effort. Without Nativity's support, the home building effort would have ceased in 2005. Last year, the combined crews built a home for the New family. The family had a total income of approximately \$24,000 and the family of four lived in a rundown trailer with significant mold and electrical issues.

We are trying to exceed our past collection efforts to reach \$100,000, but we can't do it without your help. This will be the 25th home built by Nativity and the Knights.

This year Good Shepherd Chapel in Whitley City selected the Creekmore family of three to receive the next home. The family has been living in a dilapidated trailer with mold issues that is nearly impossible to heat in the winter. The family's total income is \$17,000. Over a very compressed two weeks in June, the combined crews will build a 1,100SF, three-bedroom home, complete with porches, heating/AC, appliances, and a septic system -- the family assists if they are able. A handyman prepares the foundation and because of county requirements, we must hire local electricians, HVAC specialists, and plumbers who work side-by-side with our crews to complete the home which has significantly added to our costs. Nativity will again provide new complete beds for all the family members.

Please help if you can, but above all pray that we may be able to continue this important mission! The Knights will be collecting at all the church exits after all the Masses—checks may be made payable to Nativity Catholic Church but annotate Appalachia Home Building on the check and your church envelope number to facilitate posting to your account. Please consider electronic giving if at all possible; Appalachia Home Building is one of the designated charities. ## A message from the Nativity Creation Care Ministry





## MASS FOR THE PRESERVATION OF PEACE AND JUSTICE IN HAITI



For much of the past year the people of Haiti have suffered from political turmoil, gang violence, and lack of food and fuel. Our parish, through Operation Starfish, has developed deep relationships with our brothers and sisters in Haiti. 



In this Sunday's Gospel reading, we hear of the fulfillment of the prophecy given by Isaiah in the first reading: Because of Jesus Christ, the people you know who are living in darkness have seen the light that will heal them. Who is making no effort to get out of their sininduced misery? Who is overshadowed by the demons of spiritual death and destruction? Whose stubbornness is causing you great anguish?

Through your prayers and faithful love, Jesus has been revealed to them. Even as they fight against this truth and hide from him, the great light of Christ cannot be turned off. Soon or eventually this will cause great rejoicing, not only for you, but for those who are being rescued.

Elsewhere (Luke 12:49-50), Jesus expressed his feelings about people who live in darkness: "How great is my anguish until it is accomplished!" Thus, he knows your anguish and *shares* it, but more deeply and fervently. He is doing more than you know, more than you can

imagine, to accomplish the victory for which you've been praying. He is doing everything possible – as well as the impossible – to bring it to fulfillment.

Pray that Divine Providence will use the bad consequences of each person's stubborn rebellion to draw them to himself. Pray that God will use others to bring them into his light. Pray that God will work in his own



way to dissolve their spiritual rebellion. Pray that after their conversion they will spread the light of Christ powerfully. And pray that their conversion will be deep, definite and permanent.

We don't pray to change God's mind; he's already working to bring the light of Christ to people who live in darkness. We pray to place these people into his arms, since they're not doing it for themselves.

#### Reflect & Discuss:

- † Write a list of people who are living in darkness. Will you trust in the power of Christ's great light and the victory he obtained through his death and resurrection?
- † Make a commitment to feel Christ's anguish more keenly; use this pain to energize you into daily prayer on behalf of darkened souls.
- † Think of those who are living in darkness. Get a large candle and etch their names into it. Light the candle and offer your prayers for these loved ones. If possible, do this with a prayer community for mutual support, and light this candle at all of your community meetings.



#### ¿Hacemos lo que queremos? Reflexiones para el cristiano de hoy No siempre... Parece extraño, pero la voluntad decide una cosa, y al final hacemos otra.

Tenemos un día o una semana por delante. Pensamos y deseamos hacer muchas cosas. Pasa el tiempo. Constatamos que no hemos realizado muchos proyectos planeados. ¿Por qué?

El motivo es sencillo: porque no siempre hacemos lo que queremos. Parece extraño, pero la voluntad "decide" una cosa, y al final hacemos otra...

Así, habíamos planeado ir un día al mercado para comprar más barato, pero al final nos quedamos en casa para terminar un crucigrama. O decidimos levantarnos temprano el domingo para visitar a un familiar enfermo, y no lo hicimos porque nos venció el peso de las mantas.

Gracias a Dios, en otras ocasiones sí llevamos a cabo nuestros proyectos, incluso después de superar dificultades serias. Porque no es imposible que venzamos el cansancio para cumplir una promesa buena a un familiar o amigo.

Dicen que el infierno está tapizado de buenas intenciones, de deseos irrealizados, de voluntades débiles. Al revés, el cielo es de los esforzados y valientes (cf. *Mt* 11,12), de los que optan por la verdad, la justicia, el bien y la belleza.

Necesitados de cariño Hay un cariño que nos llega continuamente y que no siempre percibimos: el cariño de Dios

Una de las necesidades fundamentales del ser humano es el cariño. Necesitamos sabernos amados. Necesitamos ser acogidos, a pesar de nuestros defectos. Necesitamos gestos concretos y sinceros de cariño.

Por no encontrar ese cariño, muchos sufren. No perciben a su alrededor miradas amigas, ni corazones acogedores, ni manos que les apoyen con afecto.

Al revés, descubrir que tenemos familiares y amigos fieles y cariñosos dilata el corazón y permite vivir con más paz, alegría y esperanza. Hay un cariño que nos llega continuamente y que no siempre percibimos: el cariño de Dios. Porque Dios nos creó con un amor eterno. Porque está siempre a nuestro lado y nos apoya suavemente. Porque nos levanta tras las caídas. Porque nos consuela en las penas. Porque nos fortalece en las dificultades.

Muchas veces ese cariño divino pasa desapercibido, en parte porque buscamos y preferimos ojos visibles, manos calientes, palabras que leemos o escuchamos en el móvil. Pero los cariños humanos son volubles, en ocasiones no son sinceros, y duele mucho descubrir que algunos un día nos traicionaron. Dios, en cambio, no nos falla nunca. Su "sí" es continuo y fiel. Tan fiel, que sigue a nuestro lado hasta el final. "Y he aquí que yo estoy con vosotros todos los días hasta el fin del mundo" (*Mt* 28,20).

Sé que tengo un Amigo fiel. Desde su cariño, mi corazón ha encontrado la paz. Con su fuerza, puedo convertirme, para otros, en instrumento de amor, en consuelo para sus penas, y en mano disponible para ayudarles en tantos momentos de la vida.

Dos detalles destacan en el Evangelio de este Domingo. En primer lugar, que Jesús se comporta como un misionero. Recorre caminos, para lanzar una invitación a cambiar de vida de acuerdo con los valores del Reino. "Dejando Nazaret, se estableció en Cafarnaún.. Pasando junto al lago... Convertíos..." Por otra parte, su mensaje encuentra eco en la respuesta decidida de los que serían sus primeros discípulos. "Venid y seguidme,,, Inmediatamente dejaron las redes y lo siguieron".

Dos detalles que, a la postre, resultarán esenciales para la Iglesia (y todos los que la componemos). Porque esta (nosotros) tendrá que ser necesariamente misionera. Es decir, proclamadora del Evangelio a los hombres de todos los tiempos y lugares. Esa es su misión, ya que debe continuar la misión de Jesús. El Papa Pablo VI nos dijo que "la Iglesia existe para evangelizar". Debe, por eso, sentirse enviada por Jesucristo a anunciar la Buena Nueva. Ningún bautizado puede pensar que puede serlo nada más que para él mismo. Sería tanto como ocultar bajo el celemín la luz que ha recibido... para que la conozcan todos los hombres. La vida del cristiano debe ser testimonio y anuncio del mensaje de Jesús de Nazaret, como la verdadera y única explicación para la vida humana y para el mundo todo. Ninguna comunidad podrá contentarse pensando que lo único que le corresponde es dedicarse a aquellos que ya han recibido el mensaje evangélico. Ya dijo el Señor que había que proclamar desde los tejados aquello que se había recibido... y aquello otro de la oveja perdida... Es decir, la Iglesia tendrá que recorrer caminos, a la búsqueda de todos los que puedan recibir el mensaje salvador.

Y, aquí, entra en juego el segundo de los detalles del Evangelio de hoy: nuestro mundo no escucha con el mismo interés (y, por eso, no responde con la misma generosidad) que lo hicieron los primeros discípulos. No es el nuestro un ambiente propicio para el fruto de la proclamación del Evangelio. Contamos incluso con elementos contrarios a los valores que en él se contienen y a las actitudes y comportamientos que de él se derivan. Hay quien habla de "apostasía" para definir la actitud mayoritaria de nuestros contemporáneos ante lo religioso, ante la Iglesia,

¿Qué hacer, entonces? No es fácil decirlo. Pero algo queda claro: no parecen válidos los métodos de otros tiempos, ante unos destinatarios bien diferentes; no parece suficiente recluirse en las sacristías, pues es muy amplio el campo por evangelizar; no es inútil, aunque sí difícil, el testimonio que debemos seguir ofreciendo, sin actitudes vergonzantes o de abandono, sin búsqueda de seguridades y sin repeticiones trilladas, sin apología vacía y sin apología hiriente...

Empecemos por la propia vida. Cada uno tiene su propia originalidad de testimonio: cada uno vive en unas circunstancias, entre unas personas... donde sólo él puede hacer llegar el mensaje del Evangelio. Lo de la identidad común y propia, parece importante. Y adecuemos al momento presente todo lo que debamos acomodar. Que no todo es malo en nuestra cultura. Que hemos de percibir en ella no sólo dificultades, sino retos que nos exigen cambio. Se trata de evangelizar nuestra cultura, en diálogo abierto y sincero con ella.

#### III DOMINGO ORDINARIO - A Evangelio: Mt 4,12-23 Llamados a la santidad

Son tres las lecturas bíblicas, que se proclaman cada domingo. Todas ellas son material utilísimo para la oración personal. Solo hace falta leerlas, pensarlas, meditarlas, "saborearlas" y dejarse interpelar por ellas, y con sinceridad responder interiormente a esos interrogantes y propuestas de vida, que inevitablemente suscitan.

En estas oraciones, o contemplaciones de la Palabra de Dios, normalmente nos fijamos en el Evangelio, la tercera, por ser la que principalmente define cada domingo, o fiesta, y orienta la liturgia eucarística. Cada año, o ciclo litúrgico, se va utilizando principalmente un Evangelio sinóptico. En este año, ciclo A, nos corresponde el Evangelio de San Mateo.

Señor, Jesús, qué viviste con pena y estupor el arresto, y posterior muerte, de Juan, el Bautista, a manos del odio, la venganza, en definitiva, el pecado humano.

Ayúdame a compartir contigo ese dolor y a aprender de tu ejemplo a ser valiente para vivir y testimoniar la Verdad, aunque me cueste el dolor del desprecio, el desgarro de la mentira y la calumnia, e incluso la muerte.

Acojo con docilidad tus primeros mensajes, que brillan como luz resplandeciente y fuego abrasador, que "devora" y santifica a todos "los que caminaban en tinieblas y en sombras de muerte": "Convertíos, porque está cerca el Reino de los cielos".

Pero sobre todo, Seor, te contemplo en el Evangelio de hoy "paseando junto al lago de Galilea", y por tanto en los mismos lugares donde la gente trabaja y disfruta, se relaciona y convive. Ahí precisamente, en el trabajo profesional, encontraste a los primeros apóstoles, aquellos que serían tus amigos íntimos, tus representantes, los primeros evangelizadores del mundo.

De entre trabajadores normales y corrientes elegiste a "los primeros obispos y sacerdotes" para acompaarte, intimar contigo y prepararse para la misin apostlica. "Venid conmigo y os haré pescadores de hombres".

También hoy, Señor, buscas trabajadores de tu viña, pescadores de hombres, cristianos auténticos, apóstoles generosos y valientes. A todos nos llamas a seguirte, a ser santos en nuestra vida ordinaria de trabajadores normales y responsables, y a ser apóstoles intrépidos con el testimonio de la vida y el servicio social. Para todos es tu llamada a la santidad y al apostolado en la vida ordinaria, aunque a algunos les pides la santidad en la vida sacerdotal o religiosa.

Avúdame. Señor a responder generosamente, con


