

Fr. Simeon Gallagher, OFM Cap., is the Director of the Preaching Ministry Office of the Mid-America Province of the Capuchin Order. He conducts retreats, parish development programs, parish missions and religious education workshops. His association with the Emmaus Spirituality Program for Priests has gained him an international reputation in conducting retreats for priests. His work has taken him to Central America (El Salvador). He was instrumental in founding Emmaus in Great Britain, and he has presented ecumenical lectures at the Jean XXIII Centre, Geneva, Switzerland. For the past several years, he has worked closely with the US Armed Forces at military bases around the world. He recently returned from engagements in Asia and Australia.

On This Date in Nativity History 5 August 2004



On August 5, 2004, a Funeral Mass was offered at Nativity for Father Salvator Ciullo, Nativity's second pastor. The celebrant was Arlington Bishop Paul Loverde. Father Ciullo died 25 July while visiting family in Italy. He was 73. Father Ciullo was

pastor at Nativity for 12 years, from 1984 to 1996. After leaving Nativity in 1996, he served as founding pastor of St. Raymond of Penafort Parish in Fairfax Station, where he served until 2000 when he became pastor of Queen of Apostles Parish in Alexandria. He retired in December 2000. At the time of his death, he was living in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. Interment followed at Mount Comfort Cemetery in Alexandria.

Man on the Move with the Gospel A Friar's Preaching Ministry

When Jesus gave us the Our Father He taught us to pray: "Thy Kingdom come." In His final marching orders to the Apostles He challenged them: "Go, teach..." One Mid-American friar "on-the-Go" of the Gospel is Fr. Simeon Gallagher. Through his preaching ministry he is preserving and extending the frontiers of the Lord's Kingdom.

After his pastoral experience in parish work and university campus ministry, Simeon became part of the Emmaus Program, a pool of priests devoted to preaching in the United States and Europe. Since 1985 he has been a one-man "mission band" preaching parish missions, retreats for clergy, and religious communities.

His busy schedule has taken Simeon from coast-to-coast, Hawaii, England, and Ireland. Men and women in the United States military stationed in Germany and South Korea have found Simeon sharing the Good News of the Kingdom among their ranks. The uniformed men and women at several

"I have been blessed by the various ministries I have done: campus ministry, parish ministry, teaching ministry, and military ministry, but the preaching ministry has been a grace beyond imagining. It has given me a first-hand experience of the vitality of American Catholicism.

"The depth of spiritual development in our Catholic people continues to delight me. Despite our imperfections and shortcomings as a Catholic community, the enthusiasm and commitment of our priests and people are a source of hope for the future.

A Preacher Named Simeon

Fr. Simeon Gallagher grew up in Philadelphia and became connected with the Capuchins at Herman, Pennsylvania, at the age of 14. Joining the friars in 1958, Fr. Simeon was ordained a priest by Capuchin Bishop Firmin Schmidt in 1971.

Before going on the road, Simeon served as campus minister at Fort Hays State University, co-pastor of Good Shepherd parish in Shawnee Mission, Kansas, and pastor of Holy Cross church in Thornton, Colorado. During final preparations for itinerant preaching, he also served as assistant pastor and campus minister in Coral Gables, Florida.

Simeon is a voracious reader and ever seeks to expand his vision. Beyond multiple Master's degrees - religious education (1970), English literature (1980), and liberal arts (1996) - he also has done extensive doctoral level studies in preaching.

Besides hundreds of parish missions and retreats to religious communities and open retreats at retreat centers, he has frequently tackled the more demanding task of leading retreats for the diocesan clergy of at least 65 of the nation's 194 dioceses - as well as those in Birmingham, England.

Every month or so, Simeon returns to his home friary, presently St. Francis of Assisi in Denver, to receive the fraternal and prayerful embrace of his brothers and to prepare for the weeks ahead "on-the-Go" of the Gospel.

"My theology of preaching contains these elements: the goodness of creation and the human person, the salvific activity of the Father's love in the person of Jesus His Son, the call of the Spirit to strive for unity, truth, etc., and the importance of being led in the Spirit into community so as to be fed and sustained by the historical reality of the millions of people who remind

me of my own interconnectedness, an interconnectedness that sustains me and loves me in spite of my failure and sin."







Saturday February 11 Genesis 3:9-24 Ps 90:2-4abc,5-6,12-13 Mark 8:1-10 Jesus tells us: "You are the salt of the earth." What does it mean to be salt? Think about what salt does. It adds flavor to foods that lack sufficient taste.

Jesus also raises the point that if we lose our flavor, how can it be restored? The answer is: Only by letting God renew us.

In your baptism, you were made flavorful – alive with God's love, peace, joy, etc. Fruitful Christians are those who evangelize by adding the seasoning of God's life – God's love, peace, joy, etc. – to the lives of the people around them.

But beware of trying too hard! What happens when food is oversalted? It tastes horrible. No matter how good our intentions might be, if we come on too strong, we do more harm than good.

People are much more likely to turn to Jesus if they first experience his love from us, his peace in how we treat them, and his joy in the way we live our lives. They need to discover that Jesus loves them just the way they are, that he is gentle but sincere when inviting them to grow spiritually, and that he can help them turn hardships and troubles into blessings and joys.

Jesus also tells us to be a light that others cannot help but notice – but not a light that blinds. To flavor the lives of others with the presence of Jesus, we have to let his light shine in us. We have to be so lit up by Christ that others cannot help but notice.

Additionally, Jesus says that we have to be a city. We cannot evangelize alone. A "city" is a group of Christians: a parish, a family, a church organization. Being Christian means being in community. When our light is joined to the light of others, our



collective glow is much more effective in revealing Christ to the world. Why? Because non-believers learn that the love of Christ is real when they see us living in love with each other: unconditionally, generously, with a servant's heart (see Acts 2:42-47).

We are the light of Christ for each other. We are seasoning for each other. Without each other, our light dims, our flavor fades, and we become useless to God's kingdom.

Reflect & Discuss:

- In what ways have you oversalted someone by trying too hard or too often to evangelize? What were the results? What will you do to rectify this?
- What obstructs the light of Christ within you? What in you needs to change so that the people around you can see him better?
- What clues help us identify people whose lives are lacking the full flavor of Jesus' love? How could their lives be seasoned with the love of Jesus that is in you? And in your parish?

Aquel que a sí mismo se ha definido como "luz de mundo" nos pide en este domingo ser eso: ¡Luz para los demás! ¿Cómo llega la luz hasta nuestra casa? Preguntaba un niño a su padre. ¿Es la Eucaristía una cosa sagrada?

La Eucaristía NO ES UNA COSA, aunque le pongamos el adjetivo de sagrada. La Eucaristía ES UNA PERSONA; es la presencia de una PERSONA SANTISIMA: Jesucristo Nuestro Señor

¿Es la Eucaristía una cosa sagrada?

Si lo fuera seríamos idólatras y, por cierto, de los más vulgares, baratos y corrientes.

Sin embargo, cada vez que hago esta pregunta, la respuesta rápida es: ¡sí!

Por alguna razón el Pueblo de Dios ha mantenido esta idea corrupta de la Eucaristía, en su mente y en su corazón, que pervierte sus sentimientos hacia quien está presente en los dones consagrados.

Y es que la Eucaristía NO ES UNA COSA, aunque le pongamos el adjetivo de sagrada.

La Eucaristía ES UNA PERSONA; es la presencia de una PERSO-NA SANTISIMA: Jesucristo Nuestro Señor, El Verbo Eterno, la Segunda Persona de la Santísima Trinidad.

Quizá en parte se deba a que se le designan sus características con palabras que, fuera de un contexto complementario que manifieste su calidad de persona, en principio dan idea de cosas.

Así sucede con las palabras como sacramento, santísimo o Santísimo Sacramento con que se ha designado a la Presencia Santa durante siglos.

Y no es que esas palabras designen algo que no es.

La Eucaristía es verdaderamente un sacramento. El Señor no se presenta con un cuerpo físico como hace dos mil años lo fué Jesús de Nazaret, sino que se presenta como signo en los dones consagrados, es decir, como sacramento.

Igualmente, es verdaderamente Santísimo --o Santísima (Eucaristía) --; es el Señor "tres veces santo"; es aquel de quien se dice "ángeles y querubines dicen santo, santo, santo".

Como Dios Hijo es verdaderamente el Santísimo que se presenta como Sacramento. Es realmente el Santísmo Sacramento.

El problema está, como se dijo antes, que esas palabras tienen que ir complementadas con otras que afirmen y confirmen que el Santísimo, o el Santísimo Sacramento, es una Persona.

Por ejemplo, en las preces litánicas para la reserva del Santísimo Sacramento se dice maravillosamente: "Bendito sea JESÚS en el Santísimo Sacramento del Altar".

En nuestro Ritual Nacional, en México, se dice: "¡CRISTO, Pan Celestial, danos la vida eterna!"

La Adoración Nocturna Española tiene como su lema de presentación; ¡Adorado sea JESÚS Sacramentado!

Frases acordes a esta necesidad serían: "El Señor Jesús en el Santísimo Sacramento"; "El Señor de la Eucaristía"; "Nuestro Señor Jesucristo Sacramentado"... y así de forma semejante.

Con la palabra eucaristía sucede lo mismo. Igualmente, al usarla sin su contexto de persona, como primera idea se entiende una cosa. Alguien podría decir, peyorativamente, que se es perfeccionista. Entonces pregúntese si es válido el actual desprestigio del Resucitado, el Viviente de la Eucaristía, que se observa en los ambientes de fe, tan infestados, más en otras latitudes, de relativismo infantil. Para muchas otras fiestas y celebraciones religiosas, hay ocasiones en que se derrocha gusto y fervor, se hacen las inmensas peregrinaciones. ¿Cuántas peregrinaciones grandiosas, al menos en nuestro país, se harán a Guadalajara con motivo del Congreso Eucarístico Internacional, para acudir al llamado del Señor de la Eucaristía, Nuestro Dios y Señor Jesucristo? ¿O siquiera peregrinaciones sencillas? Quizá se realicen de estas últimas; pero pocas.

Es que la cosa no llama, no se le escucha; la cosa solo sirve para usarse utilitariamente.

Pero si sabemos que quien llama es una persona, se pondrá más atención al llamado. Y si amamos a esa Persona, porque sabemos que nos ama con amor divino e infinito, más fácilmente acudiremos a su llamado; es que no podemos quedar mal con ALGUIEN que amamos y que sabemos que nos ama. San Pedro Julián Eymard, Apóstol de la Eucaristía, observa: "La Eucaristía es la Persona del Señor...La Sagrada Eucaristía es Jesús pasado, presente y futuro... Es Jesús hecho Sacramento". Y con palabras que son válidas en nuestros días, también dice: "El gran mal de nuestra época es que no vemos a Jesucristo como su salvador y a su Dios. Se abandona el único fundamento, la única fe, la única gracia de la salvación... Entonces ¿qué hacer? Regresar a la fuente de la vida, pero no al Jesús histórico o al Jesús glorificado en el cielo sino al Jesús que está en la Eucaristía..."


El Pueblo de Dios merece que se le anuncie la verdad sobre el Viviente que está con nosotros en la Eucaristía.

Que sepa que Dios misericordioso ha puesto su tienda junto a la nuestra: "Y el Verbo se hizo carne y habitó entre nosotros..." (Jn 1, 14). "He aquí que Yo estoy con ustedes todos los días hasta el fin del mundo" (Mt 28, 20). "No los voy a dejar huérfanos; volveré para estar con ustedes. Dentro de poco, los que son del mundo ya no me verán; pero ustedes me verán y vivirán porque Yo vivo" (Jn 14, 18-19).

El Señor Jesús, en la Eucaristía, se ha hecho, por amor, nuestro vecino, nuestro amigo, nuestro confidente, nuestro prójimo.

Es la Persona del Santísimo Sacramento, la Eucaristía, que, brazo al hombro, nos va contando de cómo Él va preparando nuestra historia rumbo a la patria prometida y de cómo, en comunión con Él, compartimos el mismo destino: la instauración del Reino.

¡Adorado sea el Santísimo Sacramento! ¡Ave María Purísima!

Take steps to share your faith during Lent

Jesus didn't intend for the Great Commission – "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19) – to be a heavy burden. He meant witnessing to His love to come through the natural course of living a Christ-inspired life. Consider making more disciples this

life. Non-believers may hear what we say about Jesus, but they are persuaded by seeing how our love for Him shapes our lives. It is critical that worship – Sunday Mass, Confession, Scripture – informs our life choices. When we spend time in Jesus' presence, His character rubs off on us. Bring Christ out into the world. Jesus asked that we care for the poor and

needy, thus acting as His hands and feet in the world. We may not be able to solve all of their problems, but we can show them the reality of Christ's love in their lives.

Talk about God's plan. God wants us each to experience the peace He offers. Help others know that God's love is personal and He

has a specific plan for each of us.

Invite. Some people will be ready to "come and see," so consider inviting seekers to Mass. Others might be ready to "take up and read." Share your favorite inspirational reading. If you need other suggestions, ask your pastor or favorite religious.



When we use our voices, our minds, and even our bodies during prayer, we pray with deeper meaning and enthusiasm. During the Confiteor at Mass, for example, we strike our chest three times, saying, Why do Catholics strike their chests?

"through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault." It's an ancient symbol of sorrow and repentance for having offended God or hurting our neighbor. Such a gesture reminds us to take responsibility for our actions and pray for forgiveness and grace to change.

Yet, the world can work against our

efforts for



holiness. St. Peter tells us to "escape the corruption in the world caused by evil desires" (2 Peter 1:4). Ask God often to protect you from sin, to give you the wisdom and courage to make good choices and, become sensitive to the promptings of the Holy Spirit. God will reveal when you've messed up, and rejoice with you when you get it right.

Serve without complaint

Every job has aspects about it that are tedious, messy, and unrewarding, yet they are necessary. However, they can be opportunities to grow in virtue: humility, patience, self-discipline, etc. When you dread doing your work, smile and say a prayer, "and your Father, who sees in secret, will repay you" (Matthew 6:4).

"The works of God are all of them good; in its own time every need is supplied" (Sirach 39:16).

Lent leads us back to God

"For gracious and merciful is he, slow to anger, rich in kindness, and relenting in punishment" (Joel 2:13). Lent may be a penitential season, but it is also a wonderful reminder that no matter how we let sin interfere in our relationship with God, He always wants us back. Gracious and merciful is He.

"Return to me with your whole heart." Throughout the year, sin creeps into our daily lives almost without our noticing. A bad habit such as using bad language or gossiping can keep us from loving God fully. Lent is a time to examine our lives and sweep aside whatever keeps us from giving God our whole heart.

"Rend your hearts, not your garments." God doesn't just want outward acts of repentance. Our Father wants a change of heart. Start with Confession and then practice virtues such as prudence, temperance, and fortitude.

"Gather the people, notify the congregation." Become more active in your parish to build it up. Consider attending Mass more often than just once a week.

In this passage, Jesus is tempted by the devil. Having witnessed the Father's declaration at His baptism, Satan tested Jesus' identity as the Son of God. His goal was to tempt Jesus to embrace an earthly and political mission and to distract Him from the suffering and death that would lead to the world's salvation.

Satan tempted Jesus ' to satisfy His hunger with a miracle - to put physical needs above spiritual needs. In His response, Jesus taught us to put spiritual needs first and to entrust both body and soul to God's care. Next, Satan commanded Jesus to jump from



Lent begins February 22, and is devoted to the Passion of Our Lord. One form of observance is to pray the Stations of the Cross and meditate on Jesus' walk to Calvary.

February 1 - St. Brigid of Ireland (525). Born to an Irish chieftain and an enslaved mother in Ireland, St. Brigid founded a monastery for monks and nuns at Kildare and served as abbess until her death.

February 11 - Our Lady of Lourdes (1858). A heavenly "lady" appeared to St. Bernadette Soubirous, a poor girl

chose the Cross because it was the only way to save us. When tempted to do what's "easy" versus what's morally right, ask for the strength to choose what's right.

ordained in 977. He wrote treatises. letters, mystical poems, and Scripture commentaries

What's a simple way & to explain the Faith, if asked?

St. Peter says to be ready to "account for the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15). Consider using this simple, five-point explanation, inspired by Bishop Michael Jackels:

Pinky: The smallest finger recalls our weakness and need for a Savior.



Although Jesus redeemed us, we're still weak and must pray for God's graces daily.

Ring finger: To save us, Jesus took on our human nature, "wedding"

Himself to us. At Sunday Mass, we worship God and become one with Him in Holy Communion.

Middle finger: Jesus was raised up on the Cross for sins, then raised from the dead. We attend Confession monthly and receive the saving graces. We hope to be raised to eternal life.

Pointer: Jesus' call is universal, yet personal. He singled you out and chose you to follow Him; only you can give Jesus your "Yes" - in word and deed.

Thumb: Lastly, hitchhikers point their thumbs to ask, "Are you on my way?" Likewise, we're called to ask, "Are you going His Way?" (John 14:6).

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
