A Message from our Pastor Fr. Bob Cilinski



"Jesus drove them all out of the temple area, with the sheep and the oxen..... and overturned their tables" - John 2:15

My dear parishioners,

The cleansing of the temple by Jesus was imitated by Pope Francis in December 2014 in his own style when he gave the annual "Christmas message" to the Roman Curia. Francis' list of 15 Diseases of the Roman Curia was met with surprise and shock by its audience. The ailments included gossip, working too hard, forming closed circles, and being boastful. It was meant to be a sort of cleansing of the church hierarchy in the Vatican.

Some outside the church have found it a useful guide for their own organizations. The "Oxford magazine" reprinted an edited version of the 15 diseases stating that the list "sets a high standard that is applicable in Oxford as much as in Rome."

Other publications have also held up Francis' approach as one to follow. "The Economist" described the Pope as a "turnaround CEO."

Maybe we can use this list of 15 diseases as a Lenten reflection here at Nativity, choosing 2 or 3 each week of Lent to reflect on. In his humility, Pope Francis included himself in his critique of the Curia. I just love Francis!!

Here's the list. Happy Lent - love and blessings, Fr. Bob Cilinski, Pastor

15 DISEASES OF THE CURIA

- Feeling Immortal or Essential (feeling superior to everyone)
- Excessive Activity (working too hard, take time to rest a little)
- Petrification (hard heartedness)
- Over planning (detail oriented and not leaving room for the Holy Spirit)
- Bad Coordination (no team spirit or cooperation)
- Spiritual Alzheimer (lost your memory of your encounter with Jesus)
- Rivalry (being vain)
- Double Life (letting your degrees and titles create a parallel world that is not real)
- Gossip and chatter
- Deifying Leaders (careerism)
- Indifference to Others (thinking only of self)
- Funeral Face (scowling and unfriendly)
- Hoarding
- *Closed Circles (drop the cliques)*
- Worldly Profit (power games, desire for more & more power)

It received a lukewarm reception in Rome, it was like turning the tables over on them, but some in the secular world see its wisdom. The remedy for each disease is to become more like Jesus...... That is Pope Francis' hope for the Curia and for the entire Church.

Did you know?

Our Nativity Rosary Ministry distributes an average of 8,000 mission rosaries a year to foreign missions and to our parish and local community groups. We also collect Old and Broken rosaries. If you have rosaries to donate there is a grey box at the back of the church where you can place your rosaries, or medals.

(no large crucifixes or written materials, please)

These rosaries are sorted, cleaned, and repaired and then sent to the foreign missions. If a rosary cannot be completed, we use the parts for chaplets and any parts not used are buried in the ground.

What you may not know is that our rosary ministry receives packages and boxes with Old and Broken rosaries, thanks to our website, from all over the United States. In the last few years, we have recycled hundreds of repaired beautiful rosaries. If we are to continue, we will need your help to learn to repair old rosaries. You will be taught what you need to know. The day and time for 2 meetings will be decided by the group in the month of March. Once you learn our system you can work from home. 
A Message from the Nativity Creation Care Ministry

Fast from Plastic: Consider making a fast from plastic. Plastics are made from fossil fuels – four percent of the world's annual petroleum production is converted directly into making plastics, and another four percent gets burned to fuel the process. Only about seven percent of plastics are recycled. The U.S. has one of the highest plastic consumption rates in the world.

Fairfax County suggests, "Choose to refuse. By refusing, you can say NO to purchasing many items that are not ultimately recyclable. Always choose to refuse single-use plastic items, which have an average life span of 15 minutes before they are thrown away. Many single-use items may be improperly disposed of and end up as litter. Much of the plastic found floating in our oceans and rivers are single-use plastics, such as plastic bags, water bottles, takeout containers, cups, and straws. Proactively say NO to single-use items by bringing your own reusable bags and refillable beverage containers, straws, or takeout containers. Challenge yourself to find waste-free alternatives for other items provided to you with takeout food, such as napkins, beverage containers, and cutlery."

The EPA recognizes that "plastic pollution negatively affects both the environment and public health, with underserved communities often bearing the brunt of its impact. By taking action on plastic pollution, we can protect our planet and ensure that the benefits of cleaner communities and reduced exposure to harmful chemicals are accessible to all."







III Domingo de Cuaresma, Ciclo B. Los diez mandamientos Autor: P. Raniero Cantalamessa, ofmcap Sitio Web: P. Raniero Cantalamessa, ofmcap Éxodo 20, 1-17; 1 Corintios 1, 22-25; Juan 2, 13-25 Los diez mandamientos

El Evangelio del tercer domingo de Cuaresma tiene como tema el templo.

Jesús purifica el antiguo templo, expulsando del mismo, con un látigo de cuerdas, a vendedores y mercaderías; entonces se presenta a sí mismo como el nuevo templo de Dios que los hombres destruirán, pero que Dios hará resurgir en tres días. Pero esta vez desearía detenerme en la primera lectura, porque contiene un texto importante: el decálogo, los diez mandamientos de Dios. El hombre moderno no comprende los mandamientos; los toma por prohibiciones arbitrarias de Dios, por límites puestos a su libertad. Pero los mandamientos de Dios son una manifestación de su amor y de su solicitud paterna por el hombre. «Cuida de practicar lo que te hará feliz» (Dt 6, 3; 30, 15 s): éste, y no otro, es el objetivo de los mandamientos.

En algunos pasos peligrosos del sendero que lleva a la cumbre del Sinaí, donde los diez mandamientos fueron dados por Dios, para evitar que algún distraído o inexperto se salga del camino y se precipite al vacío, se han colocado señales de peligro, barandillas o se han creado barreras. El objetivo de los mandamientos no es diferente a eso. Los mandamientos se pueden comparar también a los diques o a una presa. Se sabe lo que ocurrió en los años cincuenta cuando el Po reventó los diques en Polesine, o lo que suce dió en 1963 cuando cayó la presa de Vajont y pueblos enteros quedaron sumergidos por la avalancha de agua y barro. Nosotros mismos vemos qué pasa en la sociedad cuando se pisotean sistemáticamente ciertos mandamientos, como el de no matar o no robar

Jesús resumió todos los mandamientos, es más, toda la Biblia, en un único mandamiento, el del amor a Dios y al prójimo. «De estos dos mandamientos penden toda la Ley y los Profetas» (Mt 22, 40). Tenía razón San Agustín al decir: «Ama y haz lo que quieras». Porque si uno ama de verdad, todo lo que haga será para bien. Incluso si reprocha y corrige, será por amor, por el bien de otro.

Pero los diez mandamientos hay que observarlos en conjunto; no se pueden observar cinco y violar los otros cinco, o incluso uno solo de ellos. Ciertos hombres de la mafia honran escrupulosamente a su padre y a su madre; pero se permitirían «desear la mujer del prójimo», y si un hijo suyo blasfemia le reprochan ásperamente, pero no matar, no mentir, no codiciar los bienes ajenos, son tema aparte. Deberíamos examinar nuestra vida para ver si también nosotros hacemos algo parecido, esto es, si observamos escrupulosamente algunos mandamientos y transgredimos alegremente otros, aunque no sean los mismos de los mafiosos. Desearía llamar la atención en particular sobre uno de los mandamientos que, en algunos ambientes, se transgrede con mayor frecuencia: «No tomarás el nombre de Dios en vano».

«En vano» significa sin respeto, o peor, con desprecio, con ira, en resumen, blasfemando. En ciertas regiones hay gente que usa la blasfemia como una especie de intercalación en sus conversaciones, sin tener en absoluto en cuenta los sentimientos de quienes escuchan. Además muchos jóvenes, especialmente si están en compañía, blasfeman repetidamente con la evidente convicción de impresionar así a las chicas presentes. Pero un chaval que no tiene más que este medio para causar impresión en las chicas, quiere decir que está realmente mal. Se emplea mucha diligencia para convencer a un ser querido de que deje de fumar, diciendo que el tabaco perjudica la salud; ¿por qué no hacer lo mismo para convencerle de que deje de blasfemar?

La próxima semana, nuestra parroquia realizará la Catholic Relief Services Collection. Esta colecta otorga fondos a seis agencias católicas que tocan la vida de más de 100 millions de personas en el mundo. Los fondos de esta Colecta ayudan a proporcionar alimentos a los que pasan hambre, apoyo a los refugiados desplazados, el amor de Cristo y el respeto a todas las personas. YO TAMBIÉN ESTOY hablando del temple de tu cuerpo cuando pido que dejes que este momento en Cuaresma sea un domingo para limpiarlo. Nos han dicho que nuestros cuerpos son templos del Espíritu. Debemos tratarnos a nosotros mismos y tartar a los demás con respeto. El tiempo de Cuaresma es un momento de purificación y limpieza. ¿Qué debemos corregir en nuestra vida? ¿Qué tipo de limpieza necesitamos en nuestro templo? Hemos olvidado lo importantes que somos?

Jesús muestra ira al echar del templode culto a quienes mitigarían su santidad con transacciones comerciales. El templo de nuestro cuerpo merece este mismo respeto. ¿Hay alguna manera en que hemos empañado la belleza y bondad de nuestro cuerpo con descuido o demasiados mimos? Hemos sido creados para dar gloria a Dios mediante la santidad y creatividad en nuestra vida. Resulta fácil olvidar el propósito de nuestra vida en la Tierra. Dedica tiempo a reflexionar sobre esta verdad.: eres un templo de Dios en el que Cristo mora.

APRENDE TU FE

Un tiempo para consolidar la fe y la vida Cristiana Cuaresma: un tiempo para que la celebración central de la Pascua nos encuentre un poco más cristianos Por: J. Lligadas | Fuente: mercaba.org

Desde luego las cosas han cambiado. Las abstinencias de los viernes, por ejemplo, resultan a menudo poco significativas. Y los pequeños o grandes sacrificios no tienen muy buena prensa, y además no se sabe exactamente para qué sirven y si tienen suficiente sentido. Pero a pesar de que las cosas hayan cambiado, las palabras que se nos dirán durante los días de Cuaresma seguirán siendo llamadas a hacer de este tiempo un tiempo "especial", un tiempo con entidad propia. Un tiempo para consolidar la fe y la vida cristiana, un tiempo para que la celebración central de la Pascua nos encuentre un poco más cristianos.

Habrá que plantearse, por tanto, qué debemos hacer en este tiempo de Cuaresma, cómo debemos vivirlo.

El sentido de este tiempo

La Cuaresma es el tiempo de preparación de la Pascua. En su origen, lo que lo caracterizaba de modo peculiar era el hecho de ser el tiempo de preparación más directa e inmediata de los que querían recibir el bautismo, que se celebraba en la Vigilia pascual. Asimismo, era el tiempo en que los pecadores -los que habían actuado rompiendo de forma decisiva la comunión con Dios y la Iglesia-hacían penitencia para ser reconciliados el Jueves Santo y poder celebrar de nuevo la Pascua con toda la comunidad. Nosotros, ni tenemos que bautizarnos ni -probablemente- somos pecadores que hayamos roto decisivamente la comunión con Dios y la Iglesia. Pero sin embargo el sentido de nuestra Cuaresma no debería estar muy lejos del que tenía para los que se preparaban para el bautismo o la reconciliación.

Porque sin duda es importante que, durante un tiempo concreto del año, nos digamos a nosotros mismos: "Yo fui bautizado, yo llevo en mí la marca de Jesús, yo estoy sumergido en su vida nueva. Todo eso, ¿se nota realmente? ¿no debería notarse más? ¿en qué podría notarse más?". Y decirnos también: "Desde luego mi vida no está exenta de infidelidades. ¿Soy consciente de ello? ¿Soy capaz de ponerme ante Dios y pedir perdón?" La Cuaresma es el tiempo de preparación para la Pascua. Durante los días de la muerte y la resurrección de Jesús, y durante la cincuentena que les sigue, fijaremos nuestros ojos en el camino nuevo que Jesús nos ha abierto con su fidelidad, y daremos gracias. Pero para que ello sea auténtico y verdadero, por nuestra parte, por parte de nuestro modo de vivir, deberemos llegar a la celebración pascual habiendo reforzado el seguimiento de este camino nuevo: habiendo renovado la fe y el compromiso de nuestro bautismo, y habiendo caminado hacia la reconciliación con Dios. A eso nos invita la Cuaresma. Sin pretender en la mayoría de los casos grandes cambios espectaculares en nuestra vida -¡bastante conocemos nuestras limitaciones!-, pero sí esforzándonos para que este tiempo no pase como si nada.

¿Cómo hacerlo?

Se trata de consolidar la fe y la vida cristiana, de darle impulso. Eso puede parecer quizá muy general pero conviene recordarlo.

Debemos decirnos a nosotros mismos que somos cristianos, que queremos serlo más, y que creemos firmemente que Jesucristo ha abierto en medio de nuestra historia el único camino que es absolutamente valioso. Y debemos mirar nuestra vida, hacer examen de conciencia, descubrir con limpieza de corazón qué nuevos pasos podríamos quizá dar.

Es necesario, asimismo, que los sacerdotes y demás responsables de las comunidades sepan ofrecer elementos que ayuden a esa consolidación e impulso. Por ahí debe andar la predicación de los domingos, por ahí deben ir los actos extraordinarios que acostumbran a organizarse en este tiempo (sea de forma global o acercándose a algún aspecto concreto).

Pero puede haber también algo más: algunas actuaciones peculiares que nos indiquen que nos encontramos en un tiempo peculiar. Lo que antes era la abstinencia o la no asistencia a espectáculos.anquilo, sino que tiene que salir de dentro, tiene que ser la expresión del deseo de renovar la fe y la vida cristiana.

Tradicionalmente, y en el mismo evangelio, se señalan tres actuaciones concretas: la limosna, la oración y el ayuno. El Miércoles de Ceniza leemos precisamente el fragmento del evangelio de Mateo (6,1-18) en el que Jesús habla de las tres. Valora esas prácticas, pero señala también el sentido que deben tener para que sean valiosas: no debe ser algo que se hace porque toca o para quedar tranquilo, sino que tiene que salir de dentro, tiene que ser la expresión del deseo de renovar la fe y la vida cristiana.

¿Qué significa, ahora, la limosna, la oración y el ayuno? ¿Cómo pueden vivirse cuando estamos ya en el siglo XXI?

chasing away all that wasn't right and holy in the sanctuary of God. Jesus' righteous anger and firm actions were a clear sign from the beginning of His ministry that He would fiercely protect God's house, His truths, and teachings. He was serious about His mission to teach us to know God, to love Him, and to serve Him. Jesus showed us we could trust Him to keep us on the right path to heaven.

Just as Jesus was consumed with zeal for the Father's house in the Jerusalem Temple, He is also serious about His pursuit and protection of our souls, the temple of the Holy Spirit. He wants to keep us on track to our goal of heaven. Jesus suffered

and died for our sins and then resurrected from the dead so that we may have the hope of everlasting life in heaven.

If something or someone is blocking our relationship with God, making us less loving and less willing to sacrifice our selfish desires, Jesus will send the Holy Spirit to help us surrender our hearts to His Holy Will. He will pursue us with zealous passion; all we need to do is be open, listen, and follow Him. Jesus' passionate invitation and promise of heaven are there in front of us, but we must decide to answer His call, make our path straight, follow His Way to heaven, and lead others to join us.



A consistent prayer life, studying Sacred Scripture, participation in the Mass, and frequent reception of the Sacraments, along with love and service to others, are sure ways to cooperate with God's grace and strengthen our virtue and sanctity. This will surely lead to a zealous life for God and will likely draw others to Christ, too.

Simplicity: Avoid material clutter. Consider the six month rule - if you haven't worn it or used it in the last


six months - give it away. Not only will you help those in need, decluttering creates room in our homes and hearts for God.

Why Do Catholics (Do That

Why do Catholics call Good Friday "good"?

Although it recalls a terribly sad event, Good Friday is 'good" because it is the day when Jesus saved us from our sins, reconciled us with God, and reopened Heaven. Out of what seemed like defeat. God brought victory. By His

death, Jesus conquered sin and death. On Good Friday, we see more clearly God's goodness, justice, wisdom, power, and love. "God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

"By this all men will know that you are my disciples..."

Each Triduum begins by recalling the Last Supper during which Jesus gave us the priesthood and the Eucharist as His means of remaining present to and in His Church. On Holy Thursday, we celebrate discipleship and are all asked to renew our commitment to following Jesus.

Disciples act with love. "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). True followers of Jesus know that how we treat others proves that we know Him and follow Him.

Disciples answer the call. God chooses us first, but we must answer the call. If Peter had not dropped his nets and followed Jesus, he would not have been a disciple. Discipleship involves a choice to drop everything for Him.

Disciples make other disciples. Ultimately, we need to do what Jesus did, which is to make more disciples. This was His final command, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). The Catholic Church's mission is to make disciples who make disciples.

John 20:1-9, Jesus – not death – has the last word

The Resurrection is the keystone of our Faith, making a claim no other faith can. When Mary Magdalene arrived at the tomb, she expected to find a body. Instead, she found the stone rolled back, the grave clothes neatly folded, and the tomb empty. She concluded, wrongly, that thieves had taken the Lord's body, and she ran to tell Peter and

When Peter and John arrived, Peter entered first and also saw that the grave clothes had been left behind, not left in a heap, but neatly arranged. No

grave robber would have taken the

Iohn

body and left the clothes behind.
John followed Peter and saw that
the cloth covering Christ's face
was neatly folded in a separate
place, perhaps by Christ
Himself. He saw and
believed.

The Resurrection proves that Christ is who He says He is. Therefore, we must give Him our final allegiance. Because Jesus rose from the dead in glory, we also have the hope of rising

in glory with Him on the Last Day. Christ – not death, sin, or evil – has the last word.

As followers of Christ, we're encouraged to care for each other. Jesus' parable of the judgment of the sheep and the goats (Matthew 25:31-46) lists the ways we can care for those in physical need: "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty

and you gave me drink, I
was a stranger and you
welcomed me..."
(Matthew 25:35).
These are the Corporal

Works of Mercy: to feed the hungry and give

drink to the thirsty, to clothe the naked, to visit the sick and imprisoned, to shelter the homeless and to bury the dead. Essentially, "it is by what they have done for the poor that Jesus Christ will recognize His chosen ones" (Catechism of the Catholic Church #2443).

The Corporal Works of Mercy are about being aware of others' needs and responding to them. Living the Corporal Works of Mercy is how we can make our love for God and others visible and effective. "Whatever you did for one of these...you did for me" (Matthew 25:40).

March 8 – John of God (1550). Moved to repentance by a homily of St. John of Ávila, St. John left his career in the Portuguese military to establish a hospital for the sick and poor. After his death, his assistants formed the Brothers Hospitallers.

March 19 - St. Joseph, Husband of Mary (1st century). Jesus' earthly father and husband to the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph is a model of fatherhood and a protector of families.


March 24 - Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion (1st Century). On Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion, we recall Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, when He was greeted by cheering crowds waving palms. This Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week.

March 26 - St. Margaret Clitherow (1586). St. Margaret converted to Catholicism soon after she married, when Catholicism was illegal in England. Margaret continued to practice her faith, even hiding priests in her house so they could say Mass. She remained joyful, faithful, and peaceful until her martyrdom.

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
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
