Remember your Mercies O, Lord - Psalm 25

My dear parishioners:

Today, on Respect Life Sunday, we commit ourselves to the protection of all human life from conception to natural death so that our nation may be a land known for its honor and its love of truth, guided by the God in whom we trust.

Archbishop Bill Lori of the Diocese of Baltimore wrote in his respect life statement:

Pope Francis has called upon us to build what he and Pope John Paul II have called "a civilization of love," a civilization where the rights and dignity of each person - especially those who are most vulnerable, the unborn and the frail elderly - are respected from the moment of conception until natural death; where the family, based on the love of husband and wife, welcomes children into the world and imparts to them the truths and values that make good citizens; where the hungry and homeless are assisted, the immigrant welcomed, the environment protected, and all legitimate paths to peace are pursued. It is in light of that task of ours that we evaluate the moral quality of what is proposed by candidates and public officials, and work proactively for the ongoing transformation of our society.

When he visited us, Pope Francis praised Americans for their generosity and hope. He affirmed for us the dignity of all human life. He asked us to abolish the death penalty, to be true to the dreams of our country of freedom, equality, social justice, and dialogue. He called us to be true to our founding ideals and principles. Now is the time to respond to his challenge.

Statement from Bishop Michael F. Burbidge on Respect Life Month

For more than half a century, the Catholic Church in the United States has paused at the start of October to celebrate Respect Life Month. During this month, we give special thanks to God for the gift of every human life, made in his image and likeness. We also acknowledge the dignity of every human life from conception until natural death.

This year's Respect Life Month theme calls Catholics to embrace *"radical solidarity"* with pregnant mothers and their children. We live out that solidarity as we walk with vulnerable mothers through Catholic Charities and parish-based ministries like Gabriel Project, both of which surround expectant families with the practical, material and spiritual resources they need to choose life. As Catholics, we are committed to never abandoning mothers in need. With the generous support of clergy, donors and volunteers, we offer spiritual, financial and emotional help to mothers and families across our region through these ministries.

We live out radical solidarity through Project Rachel, a program which invites those hurting from their participation in abortion to experience the healing mercy of Christ and embraces them with compassion. We also show radical solidarity through our adoption ministries, which support birth mothers who choose to place their children in adoptive homes and provide resources to couples who welcome these children into their families.

Finally, we demonstrate radical solidarity when we advocate for policies and laws that enhance family life and protect the vulnerable, particularly the child in the womb.

Sadly, despite the Supreme Court's decision overturning Roe v. Wade, abortion remains legal during all nine months of pregnancy in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The government has many responsibilities, but the defense of life is its most fundamental. Defending life requires us to entrust the reins of government only to those who will protect the most vulnerable among us. This is an obligation we must take seriously and carry out prayerfully.

Next month, Virginia will be holding a critical election, as every seat in the General Assembly is on the ballot. I encourage the faithful and all people of goodwill to join in radical solidarity with the unborn, their mothers and other vulnerable persons by voting for candidates who defend life at every stage.

May Mary our Mother intercede for us as we strive to build a future for Virginia in which every life is cherished and protected in law.

LIFE CHAIN is a peaceful, prayerful public witness of pro-life individuals standing in remembrance of at least 65 million lives lost to abortion, praying for our nation, for people in crisis situations and for a permanent end to abortion. It is a visual statement of solidarity by the Christian community that abortion kills children, hurts women and men, and that the Church supports the sanctity of human life from the moment of conception to natural death. Life Chains are held all across the United States and Canada on the First Sunday in October every year!

Life Chains are a cooperative, non-denominational effort of the entire Christian community. The first Life Chain was held in 1987. The Alexandria Life Chain began in 1996. In 2018, Life Chains were conducted in 1532 towns and cities involving over one million people!

Life Chains consist of Christians quietly, prayerfully, and peacefully lining both sides of major automobile thoroughfares for 60 minutes carrying pro-life signs. The simple truth of these messages reproduced by hundreds standing 10 feet apart along Franconia Road is very effective. Life Chains are safe, legal and non-confrontational. We coordinate each event with the Fairfax County Police who have assured us of their support. We ask adults and youth to spend the hour standing in silent or group prayer. Small children, senior citizens and handicapped persons are welcome to sit, just bring your own chairs.

As in past years, Nativity parishioners will join the Alexandria Life Chain, which will extend on the North and South sides of Franconia Road from Saint Lawrence Catholic Church to Frontier Avenue near Springfield Mall. People will be lined up along Franconia Road between 2:30 and 3:30pm. Park at St. Lawrence and meet us on the nearby sidewalk.

Christ our Lord is really and substantially present in this great Sacrament, and through our participation in the devotion we enter his presence, remember the salvation he won for us, rejoice in him, and become signs of his divine renewal in our world.

The devotion of *Forty Hours* originated six centuries ago in Milan. The practice spread quickly in the West through figures such as St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Philip Neri, St. Charles Borromeo, Pope Clement VIII, and Pope Clement XII. It was fervently promoted in the United States by St. John Neumann, the fourth bishop of Philadelphia, and in 1866, the devotion was approved for use throughout the United States.

In the Diocese of Arlington, *Forty Hours* was widely celebrated following the establishment of the diocese in 1974 and has remained an important devotion in many parishes. In remembering our Catholic heritage during the first preparation year leading to the diocesan golden jubilee, each parish in the Diocese of Arlington will celebrate *Forty Hours*.

OPENING MASS

Forty Hours opens with the celebration of Mass, for "the celebration of the Eucharist in the sacrifice of the Mass is truly the origin and the goal of worship which is shown to the Eucharist outside Mass" (Eucharisticum mysterium, no. 3e).

Exposition

At the conclusion of Mass, the Blessed Sacrament is solemnly exposed in a monstrance on the altar.

O SALUTARIS HOSTIA · O SAVING VICTIM

O salutaris Hostia, / Quae caeli pandis ostium: Bella premunt hostilia, / Da robur, fer auxilium. Uni trinoque Domino / Sit sempiterna gloria, Qui vitam sine termino / Nobis donet in patria. Amen. O saving Victim, opening wide / The gate of Heaven to man below; / Our foes press hard on every side; / Thine aid supply; thy strength bestow.

To thy great name be endless praise, / Immortal Godhead, One in Three. / Oh, grant us endless length of days, / In our true native land with thee. Amen.

Adoration

Adoration of the Most Holy Eucharist takes place for the remainder of the period of public prayer, interrupted only for the celebration of daily Mass. Indeed, Exposition is "intended to acknowledge Christ's marvelous presence in the Sacrament" and "invites us to the spiritual union with him that culminates in sacramental Communion" (Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist Outside of Mass, no. 82).

Benediction

Forty Hours closes with solemn Benediction, in which the Church joined in prayer is blessed with the very Body of Christ.

On the Prayers & Hymns

The prayers and hymns of *Forty Hours* are worthy of prayerful meditation. They are beautiful and profound expressions of our Catholic faith in Christ's saving death and resurrection and in his real presence in the Eucharist.

O Salutaris Hostia and Tantum Ergo Sacramentum are sections of hymns originally composed by St. Thomas Aquinas for the Feast of Corpus Christi. The first comes from Verbum Supernum Prodiens. The second is from Pange Lingua Gloriosi, which has also come to accompany the Transfer of the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday.

The prayer "O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament" is also from Aquinas' texts for Corpus Christi, and it remains the opening prayer of the Mass for this feast.

The Divine Praises were composed in Italian by Fr. Luigi Felici (18th century) and expanded a few years later by Pope Pius VII.

Holy God, We Praise Thy Name paraphrases the Te Deum, a 4th-century hymn still sung in the Office of Readings. Holy God was composed in German by Fr. Ignaz Franz (18th century) and translated into English by an American priest, Fr. Clarence Walworth. The verses above are the first and fifth of the eight-verse original.

The central and enduring themes of Catholic social teaching are organized under four principles that provide a moral framework for decisions in public life.

The Dignity of the Human Person

Human life is sacred. The dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. Direct attacks



on innocent persons are never morally acceptable. In our society, the gravest example is abortion. Euthanasia, assisted suicide, human cloning, in vitro fertilization

and the destruction of embryos for research are others. Protecting the dignity of life also includes overcoming poverty, ending use of the death penalty, and opposing racism, torture, unjust war, human trafficking and all activities that contribute to the "throwaway culture" identified by Pope Francis.

The Common Good

The common good is achieved when social conditions allow people to reach their fulfillment more fully and easily. It



upholds the fundamental right to life, which makes all other rights possible. It asserts the right to food, shelter, education, employment, health care, housing, freedom

of religion and conscience, and family life. It requires an economy that serves people, not the other way around. It calls on employers to uphold the dignity and rights of workers by offering productive work, decent and just wages, adequate security in their old age, the choice of whether to organize and join unions and the opportunity for legal status for immigrant workers. Workers should contribute a fair day's work for a fair day's pay, treat employers and co-workers with respect and contribute to the common good. This principle requires we protect and care for all of God's creation, especially the most vulnerable among us, and the earth, our common home.

Subsidiarity

The human person is social. The family is the fundamental building block of society, based on marriage between a man



and a woman, a sanctuary for creation and nurturing of children. Policies and programs should defend, strengthen and respect this foundational unit and uphold parents'

rights and responsibilities to care for and educate their children. Further, every person and association has a right and duty to actively shape society and promote the well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable. Subsidiarity means that society's larger institutions should not overwhelm or interfere with smaller or local ones. These larger institutions are obliged, however, to protect human dignity and meet human needs when smaller institutions cannot adequately do so.

Solidarity

We are one human family, despite our national, racial, ethnic, economic and ideological differences, called to love our neighbor as ourselves. We must work to



eradicate poverty, disease and racism; and welcome immigrants, refugees and asylum seekers who are seeking employment, safety, education and

a better life for their families. Solidarity requires preferential concern for the poor. A basic moral test of any society is how it treats those who are most vulnerable. This preferential option for the poor and vulnerable includes all who are marginalized – unborn children, persons with disabilities, the elderly and terminally ill, victims of injustice and oppression and immigrants.

Jesus said that tax collectors and prostitutes (professions considered to be the most contemptible and unholy) were entering

the kingdom of God ahead of religious experts!

These so-called "experts" knew the correct answer to the question that Jesus posed – they knew to say yes to God – but knowing the right answer and actually DOing the right answer is the dividing line between heaven and hell.

God doesn't want right answers; he wants righteous actions. God doesn't want dutiful compliance to Church teachings; he wants obedience motivated by love and an enthusiastic attitude of serving in the mission of the Church.

What's the value of going to Mass every Sunday, for example, if it doesn't result in deeds of holiness outside the Mass?

Do you know someone who's saying "no" to coming to Mass? If they're doing good works because they genuinely love God, who's to say they won't reach full unity with him sooner than people who attend every Mass but do little to help others?

God wants us to do both: Know the right answers and be righteous. Go to Mass faithfully and be changed by it. Say yes



to his calling to make the world a better place by uniting ourselves to Christ in church and following him out the door, taking him to everyone we meet.

Reflect & Discuss:

- What opportunities to serve God in your parish or out in the community have you said "no" to? Spend some time praying to understand whether or not that was an invitation from Christ himself.
- What can you say "yes" to now?
- What types of people today are despised the most?
- Who seems least likely to get into heaven? (A terrorist perhaps? An ex-spouse?) How is it possible (to our surprise) that we might be greeted by them when we arrive in heaven? How would you feel about it?

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Sylvester Stallone: «Ser católico me pone donde debo estar» Rocky, Rambo y Stallone son duros, pero Dios siempre está ahí

Siendo de origen italiano, no es muy difícil concluir que nació en el seno de una familia católica. Cierto.

Y tan cierto como que metido en el mundo de los artistas, del cine, de la televisión... su fe quedó aparcada en algún momento y en algún lugar de su vida.

Efectivamente, **Rambo, Rocky o simplemente Sylvester Stallone fue así**. Pero también Dios ha tenido una llamada especial para que volviese a la fe: la enfermedad de su hija Sophia.

Porno en 1970

Sylvester Stallone nació en Nueva York, en 1946, en el seno de una familia de inmigrantes católicos. Su madre era profesora de danza y su padre, peluquero. Sylvester pronto reclamó para sí un lugar sobresaliente en el mundo de la escena.

Al principio tuvo algunos papeles secundarios para Woody Allen e, incluso, en la famosísima serie de Kojak, pero los estudios eran caros y el trabajo no abundaba. Así que lamentablemente se abría una de las páginas más oscuras de su carrera cinematográfica participando en 1970 en una película pornográfica.

El boxeador Rocky, su gran éxito

La sequía continuó hasta que en 1975 escribió el guión de Rocky y al año siguiente se estrenaba la película convirtiéndose en un éxito internacional, y haciendo del boxeador un icono del mundo del cine que habría que pasar de generación en generación, y en donde la presencia de la fe cristiana no anda muy lejos.

Una enfermedad, la puerta hacia la fe

Los tiempos cambian, **dejó de ir a la iglesia y prefirió buscar fama y fortuna**, pero Dios llamó de nuevo a su puerta y le encaminó de nuevo hacia la fe de su infancia. Para ello el Señor se valió de su hija Sophia.

Sophia nació con una enfermedad del corazón. En noviembre de 1996, con tan sólo dos meses de edad, tuvo que someterse a una operación a corazón abierto. Afortunadamente la operación salió bien, se encuentra en perfecto estado e, incluso, hace vida normal.

Parece que todo quedó arreglado. Sin embargo en una entrevista concedida a los medios, Stallone trata de encontrar las palabras para describir lo que provocó el abandono de su fe y **el revulsivo que supuso la enfermedad de su hija.** Algo muy clásico y que sucede a tantas personas: "No lo sé. Es la vida. Tu carrera profesional te está llevando por un lado, y dejas de estar en comunicación con tu familia".

Para los actores, el peso de la fama es "muy fuerte", y agregó: "Yo no tenía ninguna base sólida detrás de mí o gente que me ayudase a mantener los pies en el suelo. Me sedujo extremadamente la nueva libertad que había alcanzado".

Al tercer matrimonio

En cuanto a su vida afectiva, en 1974 se casó con la actriz Sasha Czack, de la que se divorció en 1985. En este mismo año se casó Brigitte Nielsen, cuyo matrimonio se rompió dos años después.

Sin embargo, todo empezó a cambiar a partir de la boda con su tercera y actual esposa, Jennifer Flavin, la madre de Sophia. "Cuando me casé, todo cambió", dijo, sobre todo "cuando mi hija nació enferma y **me di cuenta de que realmente se necesita un poco de ayuda aquí. Comencé a poner todo en las manos de Dios**, su omnipotencia, su perdón".

Stallone explica que ser católico "me pone donde debo estar. Estaba solo en el mundo. Pensé que iba a tener que manejar las cosas a mi manera."

Entonces "pensé que **si me pongo en las manos de Jesús** y pido comprensión y orientación, básicamente me estoy quitando el yugo de encima y **usando Su inteligencia y sabiduría para tomar las decisiones correctas**".

El mensaje cristiano en sus películas

Se trata de un proceso que no sólo afecta a su vida personal, sino también a su profesión: "Realmente siento que cuando escribí el primer guión de 'Rocky', alguien dirigía mi mano".

Algo muy similar sucede con la última película de la saga, "Rocky Balboa", donde **el actor finaliza la película "señalando con su** dedo hacia arriba y muestra respeto a Jesús".

En ella se busca que el espectador, cuando vea la película, trate "de ser capaz de escuchar a su corazón y no tanto su mente, siguiendo la orientación de alguien mucho más poderoso que tú: Jesús", explica Stallone.

En Rocky I: antes que nadie, Jesucristo

"En 'Rocky I', la primera persona que vimos fue a Jesús", explicó en referencia a una escena de apertura del club de boxeo donde hay un gran mural de Jesucristo en una pared del fondo.

Y si un sexto "Rocky" no es suficiente, hay "Rambo IV" donde el mensaje es más claro: "**Rambo es un ateo que no cree en nada**. Su trabajo consiste en llevar a un grupo de misioneros católicos río arriba en un territorio muy hostil, y Rambo **está allí para llevar la Palabra de Dios y la medicina a los nativos**".

Parece ser que el héroe de la pantalla grande, de cuerpo descomunal, experimentado luchador, para quien la vida y a la muerte no valen nada, mientras se dedica a salvar al mundo también está necesitado de Dios.



Vigesimosexto Domingo en el Tiempo Ordinario (1 de Octubre de 2017)

En el Evangelio de hoy Jesús nos dice que si creemos en EL, y vivimos Sus enseñanzas, podremos entrar en el reino de Dios. Al respecto, Francisco de Sales nos dice lo siguiente:

Jesús ha venido para enseñarnos lo que debemos hacer para amar de forma divina. Su mensaje confunde a esa cultura que nos incita a perseguir logros falsos, una cultura que constantemente nos vende ideas como "¡Qué felices que son las personas acaudaladas!" A los ojos de Jesús, los bienaventurados son aquellos que viven la vida con plena confianza en Dios. Ellos obtendrán la paz y la tranquilidad perpetua. Ellos escuchan la palabra de Dios, la reciben, y se benefician de ella.

Existen dos razones por las cuales las personas no se benefician de la palabra de Dios. En primera instancia, puede que verdaderamente la escuchen y que ésta remueva algo en su interior, sin embargo deciden no hacer nada al respecto hasta el día siguiente. Nuestra vida es el hoy que estamos viviendo. ¿Quién puede prometerse a sí mismo un mañana? Nuestra existencia consiste en el momento presente que vivimos ahora. Sólo contamos con la certeza de este instante que estamos disfrutando, sin importar cuán breve sea.

Segundo, hay personas que poseen una gran cantidad de conocimientos, que se dedican a acumular todo tipo de consejos espirituales y de información, pero jamás los ponen en práctica. La única forma en que realmente aprendemos algo de las enseñanzas impartidas por Jesús, es cuando las hacemos parte de nuestra vida diaria. Para vivir a Jesús debemos darnos la oportunidad de deshacernos de nuestras emociones, hábitos, y afectos desordenados.

Debemos transformar nuestras emociones y afectos para que nos ayuden a convertirnos en personas que aman de manera divina. Esto sólo podremos hacerlo, una vez que desechemos todo aquello que haya en nosotros que no provenga de Dios. Para poder dejar nuestros vicios debemos poner en práctica las virtudes que nos ayudan a contrarrestar los vicios de los que queremos librarnos. Por ejemplo, si nuestra ira está fuera de control debemos poner en práctica la gentileza y la paciencia. No se preocupen por nada que no sea seguir las enseñanzas de Jesús. Confien en la bondad de Dios; EL sin duda alguna les otorgará todo lo que necesitarán para poder entrar en Su reino.

Pero, Tú, Señor, quieres otras "bondades" más exigentes y comprometidas, y por supuesto más valiosas y gratificantes. ¡Es tan fácil ensimismarse con las propias cualidades y virtudes! ¡Somos tan propensos a autojustificarnos y sobrevalorarnos en exceso! ¡Es tan fácil ver la paja en el ojo ajeno, que, aún sin darnos cuenta.

impedimos ver los defectos, pecados y limitaciones, tan grandes como vigas, en nuestra cara!

Pero, Tu, Señor, nos abres un camino llano y carretero, repleto de posibilidades y ayudas, para que todos podamos caminar por él, disfrutar del trayecto, y llegar felices y satisfechos a la meta.

Que la verdadera fe me ayude a conocerme como soy y cómo debo caminar por la senda de la santidad y del apostolado.

La Devoción de las Cuarenta Horas

La Devoción de las Cuarenta Horas es un período de oración pública continua en presencia del Santísimo Sacramento. Cristo nuestro Señor está real y sustancialmente presente en este gran Sacramento, y a través de nuestra participación en la devoción entramos en su presencia, recordamos la salvación que ganó para nosotros, nos regocijamos en él y nos convertimos en signos de su divina renovación en nuestro mundo.

La devoción de las *Cuarenta Horas* se originó hace seiscientos años en Milán. La Práctica se extendió rápidamente en Occidente a través de figuras como San Felipe Neri, San Ignacio de Loyola, el Papa Clemente VIII y el Papa Clemente XII. San Juan Neumann, el cuarto obispo de Filadelfia, la promovió fervientemente en los Estados Unidos, y en 1866, la devoción fue aprobada para su uso en todo Estados Unidos.

En la Diócesis de Arlington, las Cuarenta Horas se celebraron ampliamente después del establecimiento de la diócesis en 1974 y ha seguido siendo una devoción importante en muchas parroquias. Al recordar nuestra herencia católica durante el primer año de preparación previo al jubileo de oro diocesano, cada parroquia de la Diócesis de Arlington celebrará las Cuarenta Horas.

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MISA DE APERTURA

Las Cuarenta Horas se abren con la celebración de la Misa, porque la "celebración de la Eucaristía en el sacrificio de la Misa es verdaderamente el origen y el objetivo del culto que se muestra en la Eucaristía fuera de la Misa" (Eucharisticum mysterium, no. 3e).

Exposición

Al concluir la Misa, el Santísimo Sacramento se expone solemnemente en una custodia en el altar.

O SALUTARIS HOSTIA · iOh Victima de Salvación!

O salutaris Hostia, / Quae caeli pandis ostium: Bella premunt hostilia, / Da robur, fer auxilium. Uni trinoque Domino / Sit sempiterna gloria,

Adoración

La adoración de la Santísima Eucaristía se lleva a cabo durante el resto del período de oración pública, interrumpida solo para la celebración de la Misa diaria. De hecho, la Exposición está "destinada a reconocer la maravillosa presencia de Cristo en el Sacramento" y "nos invita a la unión espiritual con Él que culmina en la Comunión sacramental" (Sagrada Comunión y Adoración de la Eucaristía fuera de la Misa, no. 82).

Bendición

Las Cuarenta Horas se cierran con una Bendición solemne, en la que la Iglesia unida en oración es bendecida con el mismo Cuerpo de Cristo.

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Sobre la oración y los himnos

Las oraciones y los himnos de las Cuarenta Horas son dignos de meditación en oración. Son expresiones hermosas y profundas de nuestra fe católica en la muerte y resurrección salvadoras de Cristo y en su presencia real en la Eucaristía.

O Salutaris Hostia y Tantum Ergo Sacramentum son secciones de himnos originalmente compuestos por Santo Tomás de Aquino para la fiesta del Corpus Christi. El primero proviene de Verbum Supernum Prodiens. El Segundo es de Pange Lingua Gloriosi, que también ha venido para acompañar el Traslado del Santísimo Sacramento el Jueves Santo.

La oración "Oh Dios, que en este maravilloso Sacramento" también es de los textos de Santo Tomás de Aquino para el Corpus Christi, y sigue siendo la oración de apertura de la Misa de esta fiesta.

Las Alabanzas Divinas fueron compuestas en italiano por el Padre Luigi Felici (siglo XVIII) y ampliadas unos años más tarde por el Papa Pío VII.

Santo Dios, Alabamos Tu Nombre parafrasea el Te Deum, un himno del siglo IV que aún se canta en el Oficio de Lecturas. Santo Dios fue compuesta en alemán por el Padre Ignaz Franz (siglo XVIII) y traducida al inglés por un sacerdote americano, el Padre Clarence Walworth. Los versículos anteriores son el primero y el quinto del original de ocho versículos.
