A Message from our Pastor Fr. Bob Cilinski



"The vineyard of the Lord is the house of Israel" - Psalm 80

My dear parishioners:

Today the prophet Isaiah and the Gospel speak of the Lord's vineyard. The Lord's vineyard is the plan, the dream which God nurtures with all his love. He planted and nurtured it with patient and faithful love so that it can become a holy people..... a people who bring forth a harvest of abundant fruits of justice. But God's plan is thwarted and yields wild grapes. God expected justice but there is violence and cries of distress. Pope Francis tells us that God's vineyard, our sister earth, is crying out to us *"because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her."* There are other justice issues such as racism, greed, violence, hatred, which bring about God's heartbreak. This is not God's plan for his creation for we hear of God's tenderness for all human life and all creation and the loving gaze in which God watches over his vineyard.

Jesus didn't call for the elimination of the rebellious tenants, but for others to take their place and to do what's needed to be done. Pope Francis tells us, *"The Creator does not abandon us; he never forsakes his loving plan or repents of having created us. Humanity still has the ability to work together in building our common home."*

Let us do a good job of nurturing and tending the vineyard by engaging in protecting life and all of creation. In this way our hearts and minds will correspond to God's dream.

Many adults whose parents are divorced carry invisible wounds from their parents' divorce. Adult children of divorce are impacted by the emotional reality of divorce and how it affects their thoughts about marriage and family, which can impact their relationships. The impact is more than answering the question, "Who do we spend the holidays with?"

There is surviving the aftermath of divorce and the emotional hurdles. No matter the age when your parents divorce, there is a loss experienced. THE FORTY HOURS DEVOTION

The Forty Hours Devotion is a period of continuous public prayer in the presence of the Most Blessed Sacrament. Christ our Lord is really and substantially present in this great Sacrament, and through our participation in the devotion we enter his presence, remember the salvation he won for us, rejoice in him. and become signs of his divine renewal in our world.

The devotion of Forty Hours originated six centuries ago in Milan. The practice spread quickly in the West through figures such as St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Philip Neri, St. Charles Borromeo, Pope Clement VIII, and Pope Clement XII. It was fervently promoted in the United States by St. John Neumann, the fourth bishop of Philadelphia, and in 1866, the devotion was approved for use throughout the United States.

In the Diocese of Arlington, Forty Hours was widely celebrated following the establishment of the diocese in 1974 and has remained an important devotion in many parishes. In remembering our Catholic heritage during the first preparation year leading to the diocesan golden jubilee, each parish in the Diocese of Arlington will celebrate Forty Hours.

OPENING MASS

Forty Hours opens with the celebration of Mass, for "the celebration of the Eucharist in the sacrifice of the Mass is truly the origin and the goal of worship which is shown to the Eucharist outside Mass" (Eucharisticum mysterium, no. 3e).

EXPOSITION

At the conclusion of Mass, the Blessed Sacrament is solemnly exposed in a monstrance on the altar.

O SALUTARIS HOSTIA · O SAVING VICTIM

O salutaris Hostia, / Quae caeli pandis ostium: Bella premunt hostilia, / Da robur, fer auxilium. Uni trinoque Domino / Sit sempiterna gloria, Qui vitam sine termino / Nobis donet in patria. Amen. O saving Victim, opening wide / The gate of Heaven to man below; / Our foes press hard on every side; / Thine aid supply; thy strength bestow.

To thy great name be endless praise, / Immortal Godhead, One in Three. / Oh, grant us endless length of days, / In our true native land with thee. Amen.

Adoration

Adoration of the Most Holy Eucharist takes place for the remainder of the period of public prayer, interrupted only for the celebration of daily Mass. Indeed, Exposition is "intended to acknowledge Christ's marvelous presence in the Sacrament" and "invites us to the spiritual union with him that culminates in sacramental Communion" (Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist Outside of Mass, no. 82).

Benediction

Forty Hours closes with solemn Benediction, in which the Church joined in prayer is blessed with the very Body of Christ.

On the Prayers & Hymns

The prayers and hymns of *Forty Hours* are worthy of prayerful meditation. They are beautiful and profound expressions of our Catholic faith in Christ's saving death and resurrection and in his real presence in the Eucharist.

O Salutaris Hostia and Tantum Ergo Sacramentum are sections of hymns originally composed by St. Thomas Aquinas for the Feast of Corpus Christi. The first comes from Verbum Supernum Prodiens. The second is from Pange Lingua Gloriosi, which has also come to accompany the Transfer of the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday.

The prayer "O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament" is also from Aquinas' texts for Corpus Christi, and it remains the opening prayer of the Mass for this feast.

The Divine Praises were composed in Italian by Fr. Luigi Felici (18th century) and expanded a few years later by Pope Pius VII.

Holy God, We Praise Thy Name paraphrases the Te Deum, a 4th-century hymn still sung in the Office of Readings. Holy God was composed in German by Fr. Ignaz Franz (18th century) and translated into English by an American priest, Fr. Clarence Walworth. The verses above are the first and fifth of the eight-verse original.

His Mother for our own

While He was on Earth, Jesus gave all of Himself for us - even His life out of love. He even gave us His own mother to be our true mother (John

19:26-27). In turn, Our Lady works to bring us to the heart of her Son.

"To Jesus, through Mary." St. Louis de Montfort used these words to explain that devotion to Mary is the best way to grow closer to Jesus, because Marv herself will lead us to her Son if we ask for her help. When we are under temptation to sin, spiritually dry

or discouraged, let Mary take you by the hand and lead you to Jesus.

Our path to Jesus. We have one mediator in Christ (1 Timothy 2:5). Yet, what loving son refuses his mother's requests? In His generosity, God is pleased to answer Mary's prayers for us. We can ask Mary to pray with (and for) us:

"Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death."

> Entrust all we love to her. St. Maximilian Kolbe wrote, "Let us entrust to (Our Lady) all of those close to our hearts, and she, the best among mothers, will help them in the best way

possible." There is no safer place for all those we love than our Mother's arms.



two versions of the Creed?

Both creeds summarize what Catholics believe but were written at different times for different purposes. The Apostles' Creed is the summary of the beliefs of the early Church. The Nicene Creed is the expanded form of the

Apostles' Creed, stemming from two Church councils (Nicaea, AD 325; Constantinople, AD 381) to combat Arianism, which proposed Jesus was not God but a kind of super-saint. The Nicene Creed emphasizes Jesus'

divinity, His divine Sonship, and the divinity of the Holy Spirit.

Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli was born to a poor farming family in Bergamo, Italy. His ordination as a priest in 1904 began a lifetime serving the Church as the bishop's secretary, a military chaplain, cardinal-patriarch of Venice, and finally, as pope. He often visited the poor, the sick and prisoners. He also spent his brief papacy working to improve relations with the Eastern Church. He is most remembered for opening the

Second Vatican Council. He died

"Angel of God, my guardian dear ..."

"Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life," said St. Basil. The Church teaches that we each have a guardian angel, assigned to guide and protect us until death (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, #336). Jesus said: "In heaven their angels always behold the face of my Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 18:10). Tap your angel's powerful protection to grow in virtue and holiness:

Confide in your guardian. Guardian angels aren't mind-readers, but they do observe us



In their first meeting with Jesus, the Pharisees wanted to trap Him by getting Him to say something that

contradicted Jewish law. Then He could be arrested and silenced. The lawyer they sent was aware that generations of Jews had debated fruitlessly about which law was the most important. Pretending to seek Jesus' opinion, he asked Jesus to choose which of the 613 commands of the Jewish law was the most important.

Jesus silenced them all by saying everything starts and ends with love – love of God and love of others. To love



October 7 – Our Lady of the Rosary. Pope Gregory XIII named this feast because it was believed that Christians won a critical victory at the Battle of Lepanto after praying the Rosary.

October 9 – St. John Leonardi (1609). Born in 1543 in Lucca, Italy, St. John spent his priesthood ministering in hospitals and prisons and teaching the Faith. He established the Clerks Regular of the Mother of God, and helped found the Congregation of Christian Doctrine.

October 16 - St. Hedwig (1243).

while it is easy to love God, loving others is more difficult. It means including people when the natural inclination is to exclude or avoid them. Jesus loved prostitutes,

neighbor is measured by how we treat the poor, the vulnerable, and our enemies. This is how God loves and He calls us to do the same.

Born to the Duke of Croatia, St. Hedwig married the Duke Henry of Silesia. They founded a convent, h ospitals, and monasteries. After his death, St. Hedwig became a Cistercian nun, donating her fortune to charity.

October 28 – Sts. Simon and Jude (1st century). St. Simon was a Zealot – Jews who believed the Messiah would free them from political oppression. St.

Jude was a fisherman. After being called by Jesus to be apostles, they eventually traveled to Persia where they preached the Gospel until they were martyred. carefully. The more we tell them, the better they can help us make good choices, avoid sin, and keep us safe.

Ask for help. Our guardian can help make tough decisions, resolve conflicts, offer protection especially for our souls. They intercede for us, and help to prepare our souls for the moment when we stand before God.

Respect guardian power. Angels are powerful creatures, created by God to care for us. They aren't answerable to us but stand ready to help us get to Heaven.

Q Can Catholics& celebrateA Halloween?

Catholics can celebrate Halloween as a holiday with Christian roots. In 835, Pope Gregory IV moved the commemoration of All Martyrs (later All Saints Day) from May 13 to November 1. The night before became known as All Hallow's Even or "Holy



Evening," and eventually Halloween. Villagers visited local homes to gather contributions for the feast to be held the next day, All Saints Day.

Those who didn't contribute might be subject to a prank or "trick."

Catholics enjoy donning creative costumes and giving out candy, but it's important to avoid glorifying evil, death, and the Devil. Consider using the holiday to learn about a saint you didn't know or collecting food for the poor.

In short, Halloween is a chance to celebrate generosity, friendship, and community. It's the threshold of a time to remember the believers who have gone to Heaven before us and the hope we have of following. We also pray for the Holy Souls in Purgatory to strengthen them during their purification before entering Heaven.

grown while we're following Christ on our journey toward Heaven. If we love as he loves, forgive as he forgives, minister to others, teach the truth, and heal the hurting, we are living in the kingdom of God now.

When I ask Catholics if they believe they're going to Heaven, most feel very uncertain, either because they're afraid they might lose their salvation

through some future grave sin, or because they're afraid it's not humble enough to answer with a firm "yes."

Granted, we do not imitate Christ perfectly. Most of us will need to spend time in Purgatory being purged of whatever is unheavenly about us, but when the purging is finished, we'll be fully alive in the wonderfulness of God.

If we make it to Purgatory, of course we'll reach the glories of Heaven. And if our desire to be Christ-like is genuine, Jesus



will help make sure that our sins will never be so "grave" that we turn completely away from Heaven. We'll embrace gladly him when he comes for us at the moment of our death.

Whatever you do because of Christ and out of love for Christ, this is evidence that you are living in and will eternally live in God's kingdom.

Reflect & Discuss:

- What good fruits are you producing in your life now? List them; get out a pen and start writing them down. During the week, as you think of more good fruits, add those to the list.
- Look at the list you produced for the above question. How do these fruits give evidence of God's goodness within you?
- + How do they provide the kingdom of God for the benefit of others?
- + How do they assure you that you are truly a Heaven-bound follower of Christ?

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Todos los días de mi vida

El consentimiento explícito de los novios es una parte esencial, según el ritual del matrimonio, en la comprensión sacramental, para convertirse en esposo y esposa. Se puede expresar de distintas maneras. Van desde el simple: "Sí quiero" de la forma interrogativa hasta expresiones más completas. La que resulta más explícita incluye, a su vez, tres acciones esenciales: yo te recibo a ti, me entrego a ti, prometo serte fiel. Se trata, pues de una recepción recíproca, entrega mutua y promesa de fidelidad sean cuales sean las circunstancias de la vida que se comienza: la adversidad, la prosperidad, la salud, la enfermedad.

También resulta muy significativa una expresión que figura en final del consentimiento. Ha cambiado en la renovación del ritual. Estábamos familiarizados con las palabras "hasta que la muerte nos separe", según la fórmula anterior. Ahora ha cambiado y se ha convertido en esta otra: "todos los días de mi vida". La donación y recepción mutua tiene vocación de durar toda la vida. Cuando la relación que se va a reconocer, atestiguar y celebrar es lo suficientemente intensa y apasionada, no resulta imaginable la separación. El deseo de vivir juntos, programar y construir juntos el futuro es tan absorbente que uno puede y quiere anticipar el tiempo y comprometer la vida entera.

Hasta que la muerte nos una más

El proyecto de vida matrimonial es un proyecto de amor, públicamente reconocido y celebrado. Eclesialmente sacramentalizado. La entraña de dicha alianza es fidelidad para siempre. Es cierto que la muerte es un acontecimiento natural e individual; que es imprevisible y cierta, que la muerte separa a las personas en el mundo de lo visible y las cubre con un silencio sepulcral. Es cierto que significa soledad, que interrumpe la dinámica del amor de alianza. Y digo intencionadamente interrumpe. La verdad es que desde la experiencia cristiana el amor está a prueba de la muerte; que el amor es más fuerte que la muerte.

En la relación conyugal se viven momentos que los cónyuges quisieran retener y eternizar. Son esas experiencias fuertes de relación íntima y plena, en las cuales se descubre que te amo tanto que necesito que estés conmigo para siempre. Por contraste, las mismas experiencias sirven de referencia para la revisión de vida: ¿Te amo tanto que necesito que vivas para siempre?

Ese final hacia el que caminamos y esperamos traerá la plenitud de un amor y una entrega, que ya no estará amenazada por la muerte. Y esa alegre esperanza constituye una buena noticia para la vida conyugal.

La Devoción de las Cuarenta Horas

La Devoción de las Cuarenta Horas es un período de oración pública continua en presencia del Santísimo Sacramento. Cristo nuestro Señor está real y sustancialmente presente en este gran Sacramento, y a través de nuestra participación en la devoción entramos en su presencia, recordamos la salvación que ganó para nosotros, nos regocijamos en él y nos convertimos en signos de su divina renovación en nuestro mundo.

La devoción de las *Cuarenta Horas* se originó hace seiscientos años en Milán. La Práctica se extendió rápidamente en Occidente a través de figuras como San Felipe Neri, San Ignacio de Loyola, el Papa Clemente VIII y el Papa Clemente XII. San Juan Neumann, el cuarto obispo de Filadelfia, la promovió fervientemente en los Estados Unidos, y en 1866, la devoción fue aprobada para su uso en todo Estados Unidos.

En la Diócesis de Arlington, las Cuarenta Horas se celebraron ampliamente después del establecimiento de la diócesis en 1974 y ha seguido siendo una devoción importante en muchas parroquias. Al recordar nuestra herencia católica durante el primer año de preparación previo al jubileo de oro diocesano, cada parroquia de la Diócesis de Arlington celebrará las Cuarenta Horas.

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MISA DE APERTURA

Las Cuarenta Horas se abren con la celebración de la Misa, porque la "celebración de la Eucaristía en el sacrificio de la Misa es verdaderamente el origen y el objetivo del culto que se muestra en la Eucaristía fuera de la Misa" (Eucharisticum mysterium, no. 3e).

Exposición

Al concluir la Misa, el Santísimo Sacramento se expone solemnemente en una custodia en el altar.

Adoración

La adoración de la Santísima Eucaristía se lleva a cabo durante el resto del período de oración pública, interrumpida solo para la celebración de la Misa diaria. De hecho, la Exposición está "destinada a reconocer la maravillosa presencia de Cristo en el Sacramento" y "nos invita a la unión espiritual con Él que culmina en la Comunión sacramental" (Sagrada Comunión y Adoración de la Eucaristía fuera de la Misa, no. 82).

Bendición

Las Cuarenta Horas se cierran con una Bendición solemne, en la que la Iglesia unida en oración es bendecida con el mismo Cuerpo de Cristo.

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Sobre la oración y los himnos

Las oraciones y los himnos de las Cuarenta Horas son dignos de meditación en oración. Son expresiones hermosas y profundas de nuestra fe católica en la muerte y resurrección salvadoras de Cristo y en su presencia real en la Eucaristía.

O Salutaris Hostia y Tantum Ergo Sacramentum son secciones de himnos originalmente compuestos por Santo Tomás de Aquino para la fiesta del Corpus Christi. El primero proviene de Verbum Supernum Prodiens. El Segundo es de Pange Lingua Gloriosi, que también ha venido para acompañar el Traslado del Santísimo Sacramento el Jueves Santo.

La oración "Oh Dios, que en este maravilloso Sacramento" también es de los textos de Santo Tomás de Aquino para el Corpus Christi, y sigue siendo la oración de apertura de la Misa de esta fiesta.

Las Alabanzas Divinas fueron compuestas en italiano por el Padre Luigi Felici (siglo XVIII) y ampliadas unos años más tarde por el Papa Pío VII.

Santo Dios, Alabamos Tu Nombre parafrasea el Te Deum, un himno del siglo IV que aún se canta en el Oficio de Lecturas. Santo Dios fue compuesta en alemán por el Padre Ignaz Franz (siglo XVIII) y traducida al inglés por un sacerdote americano, el Padre Clarence Walworth. Los versículos anteriores son el primero y el quinto del original de ocho versículos.
