A Message from our Pastor Msgr. Bob Cilinski



"Master I want to see" - Mark 10:51

My dear parishioners,

The story of Bartimaeus is one of the most beautiful in the gospels. Jesus is making a long journey to Jerusalem and along the way his disciples follow him. He is the way!!!! The blind are taken up too. In this beautiful story it is remarkable how many times we hear the word "call"..... Bartimaeus every day waiting and hoping and calling out to Jesus. The disciples telling him to stop calling. Then Jesus says "call him over." Then they say "he is calling you." So hearing the word call reminds us of our vocation. The master is calling you.

Bartimaeus might have been physically blind, but he sees! He sees who Jesus is. He knows that Christ is passing by and calls out to him. He doesn't care that people are telling him that his quest is useless. He just calls out to Christ his simple request and he is rewarded. What do you want me to do for you? Jesus asks. The blind man shows us how to answer "I want to see." He didn't say,... "let me think about it, I'll get back to you tomorrow. He knew immediately what he needed and with precision and passion said "I want to see." I want to know your presence. I want to see my sins as they really are. I want to see the truth of the choices I face. I want healing from life's hurts. I want to see you for who you are.

Bartimaeus is given sight. And so are we. Do we live with hopes? Do we have hope for our ourselves and plans for our future? God does. And Bartimaeus did. So should we. I have great hopes for the parish of Nativity and it gives me great energy for the present. When Jesus calls we can go to him. When he asks what we want, we can tell him with precision. Let us live with hopes and trust in the Lord's love and care for us.





OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH

U.S. Bishops Affirm that Ending Abortion Remains our Pre-eminent Priority - Bishop Burbidge's Respect Life Month Statement states: Jesus calls each of us to respect that gift of life in every human person. While we live in a society that often rejects those who are weak, fragile, or vulnerable, they are the most in need of our care and protection. The law and millions of our brothers and sisters have yet to recognize this reality... But what we now see is that fifty years of virtually unlimited abortion has tragically created a national mindset where many Americans have become comfortable with some amount of abortion. This allows the abortion industry to continue to provide any amount of abortion... "abortion remains our pre-eminent priority as it directly attacks our most vulnerable brothers and sisters, destroying more than a million lives each year in our country alone." … We see many politicians celebrating the destruction of preborn children, and protecting access to abortion, even up until the moment of

birth. Pope St. John Paul II's words resonate today: "we are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life, ... we are all involved and we all share in it, with the inescapable responsibility of choosing to be unconditionally pro-life."

We must renew our commitment to work for the legal protection of every human life, from conception to natural death, and to vote for candidates who will defend the life and dignity of the human person... We must call for policies that assist women and their children in need, while also continuing to help mothers... through local pregnancy help centers... and to all who are suffering from participation in abortion... Mission Trip to Cameroon Feb1-14,2025

Viridiane's Hope for Children's Health and Education (VHCHE)

Be part of something bigger than yourself. Travel with likeminded men and women to rural areas of Western Africa and work with the locals to build wells and to remodel/repair a chapel. Missionaries will travel to New Melong, Cameroon and stay in the vicinity of Saint Anne Catholic School and will help with projects at the school. They will then travel to the villages of Bangang and Babouantou to drill drinking water wells. Time permitting, missionaries will also travel to Yaoundé, the capital of Cameroon to visit the Monastery of Our Lady of Mont Febe and the Basilica of Mary Queen of the Apostles.

- Cost of trip: \$3,500.00/person, includes airfare from Washington DC to Douala, Cameroon, basic travel insurance, lodging and meals, local transportation while in Cameroon, and VISA fees.
- All travelers must possess a valid passport that expires after August 14, 2025, and show proof of a valid yellow fever vaccine prior to applying for a visa to Cameroon.
- A deposit of \$1,000.00 is required by November 1, 2024, nonrefundable after December 1, 2024. Balance due by January 1, 2025.
- Ability to speak and understand French is an advantage, but not required.
- All travelers must be 21 or older and in good health.

Profile: Randall Smith - Let's Really Follow the Science "Follow the science!" Okay, let's do that. There's absolutely no doubt, scientifically, that human life begins at conception. At that moment, the full set of chromosomes is present that make a human life. It's not a lizard, a chimp, or a goat. It's a human being. But people are not quite getting the message, not facing the grim truth. Abortion is the termination of a human life... Terminating a life is "healthcare"?...Oppose lethal injection for convicted murderers? Good. How about innocent babies?... But some people seem to think laws against terminating human lives are "oppressive." Some philosophers say things like "It's not a person"; others shout, "It's a fetus!" But those are linguistic games, not science. If you kill a teenage girl, it doesn't become acceptable if you shout: "It was only an adolescent!" The word you use doesn't change the reality of the person. History tells us that lots of people in the past thought blacks and indigenous Mexicans were "human," but not fully "persons." That distinction has always been a mistake, and it's one of the worst mistakes we ever make. There's no point other than conception when that developing being "magically" becomes human... So we should just be honest and admit that what's being discussed is the right to terminate unwanted human lives... Let's not muddle the issue with Orwellian doublespeak like "reproductive justice" (unless "justice" means "don't kill innocent babies") or "abortion is health care" (the kind of "care" where one person always dies)...Did you know that Abraham Lincoln alienated a lot of people into seceding from the Union because they feared he would remove "the constitutional protections" for slave ownership?... It's modern science that tells us that human life begins at conception... It's a human life, a human person, and you have as much obligation to that life as you do to any homeless person, any immigrant, and any oppressed worker... Supporting a culture of individual "choice"... will never help people develop the virtues and character traits needed to protect all... They'll be just as "disposable," invisible, and forgotten as that unborn child... What would Mother Theresa of Calcutta say? You don't help the poorest of the poor by killing babies. So either stand with her and the Church or admit that you're in the company of those who think unwanted humans are disposable.

As the November Elections approach, it is a good time to review our policies regarding political activities on Church property. You can find additional information at: https://vacatholic.org/election2024/

A few principals to keep in mind:

- Distribution of partisan campaign literature (i.e. leaflets, bumper stickers, etc. that tend to support or oppose a candidate) on church property is not permitted. The same is true for any voter guides or other election-related materials *(other than those prepared by Bishop Burbidge, the Virginia Catholic Conference or the USCCB)*. If you discover someone distributing such materials, politely ask them to stop and escort them off the property.
- Candidates for political office may not be endorsed or opposed, either at Mass or through any official Church channel.
- Voter guides or election-related materials other than those prepared by Bishop Burbidge, the Virginia Catholic Conference or the USCCB, may not be distributed.

Four Principles of Catholic Social Teaching*

The central and enduring themes of Catholic social teaching are organized under four principles that provide a moral framework for decisions in public life.

The Dignity of the Human Person

Human life is sacred. The dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. Direct attacks



on innocent persons are never morally acceptable. In our society, the gravest example is abortion. Euthanasia, assisted suicide, human cloning, in vitro fertilization

and the destruction of embryos for research are others. Protecting the dignity of life also includes overcoming poverty, ending use of the death penalty, and opposing racism, torture, unjust war, human trafficking and all activities that contribute to the "throwaway culture" identified by Pope Francis.

The Common Good

The common good is achieved when social conditions allow people to reach their fulfillment more fully and easily. It



upholds the fundamental right to life, which makes all other rights possible. It asserts the right to food, shelter, education, employment, health care, housing, freedom

of religion and conscience, and family life. It requires an economy that serves people, not the other way around. It calls on employers to uphold the dignity and rights of workers by offering productive work, decent and just wages, adequate security in their old age, the choice of whether to organize and join unions and the opportunity for legal status for immigrant workers. Workers should contribute a fair day's work for a fair day's pay, treat employers and co-workers with respect and contribute to the common good. This principle requires we protect and care for all of God's creation, especially the most vulnerable among us, and the earth, our common home.

Subsidiarity

The human person is social. The family is the fundamental building block of society, based on marriage between a man



and a woman, a sanctuary for creation and nurturing of children. Policies and programs should defend, strengthen and respect this foundational unit and uphold parents'

rights and responsibilities to care for and educate their children. Further, every person and association has a right and duty to actively shape society and promote the well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable. Subsidiarity means that society's larger institutions should not overwhelm or interfere with smaller or local ones. These larger institutions are obliged, however, to protect human dignity and meet human needs when smaller institutions cannot adequately do so.

Solidarity

We are one human family, despite our national, racial, ethnic, economic and ideological differences, called to love our neighbor as ourselves. We must work to



eradicate poverty, disease and racism; and welcome immigrants, refugees and asylum seekers who are seeking employment, safety, education and

a better life for their families. Solidarity requires preferential concern for the poor. A basic moral test of any society is how it treats those who are most vulnerable. This preferential option for the poor and vulnerable includes all who are marginalized – unborn children, persons with disabilities, the elderly and terminally ill, victims of injustice and oppression and immigrants.

Make the Most of Divine Opportunities

After Jesus touches our lives – answers a prayer, gives us a healing, provides a life-changing insight, or makes any other kind of difference – what do we do next? Our life has been changed by divine grace. Do we make the most of this new opportunity?

God never forces us to take a new direction or follow a certain path, not even if we've made a bargain with him, such as: "Lord, if you heal me, I will go to Mass every day."

Jesus says to us what he said to Bartimaeus, the man he healed in this Sunday's Gospel reading: "Go your way; your faith has saved you." Go where?

Sometimes his instructions are a little more informative than that. When he cures someone from sin, he adds: "Go and sin no more". Okay, but go where?

Every step we take is important. Where we go and what we do next makes a difference that ripples off into the future with ramifications (blessings and/or woes) that are impossible for us to predict. Jesus isn't downplaying the significance of this. Rather, what happens next is so important that he wants us to have full control over it.

Jesus told Bartimaeus "Go your way." And what did Bartimaeus do with that freedom? He "followed him on the way." He opted for the best possible direction. His life changed dramatically, not only because he had been blind and now he had good eyesight, but because he wanted to learn from Jesus and become one of his followers.



How many times have we returned to an old familiar path after an encounter with Christ? If following him means taking a new direction, getting involved in a new ministry, or changing careers or friends, we too often settle back into old routines. Comfort zones are hard to leave. But following Jesus is a life-changing adventure if we're sincere about it.

Following Jesus and learning from him should be our top priority. Every encounter with Christ should change us – even at Mass when we reunite ourselves to him in the Eucharist.

- Think of the last time Jesus responded to your need for help. What changed afterward?
- + How long did the change last?
- † Describe a time when you changed directions in your life because of an encounter with Christ. What did Jesus do for you?
- + How did you figure out which way to go afterward?

Muchos lo intentaron silenciar. Como, muchos medios de comunicación, instituciones de nuestros tiempos, intentan aplacar las voces que hablan de Dios o ridiculizar las súplicas de los que quieren llegarse hasta el Señor. Pero, Bartimeo, logró captar la atención del gran Sanador y Salvador: JESUCRISTO. Supo aprovechar la ocasión y no la dejó pasar de largo. Ojala, también nosotros, podamos responder: sólo sé...que antes no veía, y ahora veo; las cosas más claras, mi vida más resuelta, mi fe más profunda y mis ideales más cristianos. La dignidad de la persona

La vida de una persona es sagrada. La dignidad de la persona es lo fundamental para haber una visión moral para la sociedad.



visión moral para la sociedad. Los ataques directos hacia personas que son inocentes nunca son moralmente aceptables. En nuestra sociedad, el ejemplo más grave es el aborto. Eutanasia, suicidio asistido, clonación,

fertilización in vitro y la destrucción de embriones para la investigación son otros. Protección de la dignidad de la vida también incluye superar la pobreza, acabar con el uso de la pena de muerte y oponerse al racismo, la tortura, la guerra injusta, el tráfico de seres humanos y todas las actividades que contribuyen a la "cultura desechable" identificada por el Papa Francisco.

El bien común

El bien común se alcanza cuando las condiciones sociales permiten que las personas logren su realización personal



plenamente y fácilmente. El bien común defiende el derecho fundamental a la vida, que hace posible todos los otros derechos. Este afirma el derecho a alimentos, vivienda,

educación, empleo, salud, libertad de religión y conciencia, y vida familiar. Este requiere una economía que atiende a personas, no al revés. Pide a los empleadores a respetar la dignidad y los derechos de los trabajadores ofreciendo trabajo productivo, salarios justos, seguridad adecuada en la edad avanzada, la opción de poder organizar y unirse a los sindicatos y la oportunidad para obtener el estatus legal para los trabajadores inmigrantes. Los trabajadores deben contribuir con un día de trabajo para la paga de un día justo, tratando a los empleadores y compañeros de trabajo con respeto y contribuir al bien común. Este principio requiere de proteger y cuidar toda la creación de Dios, especialmente a los más vulnerables entre nosotros y la tierra cual es nuestra casa que compartimos.

Subsidiariedad

La persona humana es sociable. La familia es el pilar fundamental de la sociedad, basada en el matrimonio entre



un hombre y una mujer, es un santuario para la creación y la crianza de los niños. Las políticas y los programas deben defender, fortalecer y respetar esta unidad

fundamental y defender los derechos y responsabilidades de los padres de cuidar y educar a sus hijos. Además, cada persona y asociación, en forma activa, tiene un derecho y un deber de formar la sociedad y promover el bienestar de todos, especialmente a los pobres y vulnerables. Subsidiariedad significa que grandes instituciones de la sociedad no deben abrumar o interferir con las instituciones más pequeñas o locales. Estas grandes instituciones están obligadas, sin embargo, a proteger la dignidad humana y satisfacer las necesidades humanas, cuando las instituciones más pequeñas no pueden hacerlo adecuadamente.

Solidaridad

Somos una familia humana, a pesar de nuestras diferencias



nacionales, raciales, étnicas, económicas e ideológicas, llamados a amar a nuestro prójimo como a nosotros mismos. Debemos trabajar para erradicar la pobreza, la enfermedad y el

racismo; y dar la bienvenida a los inmigrantes, refugiados y solicitantes de asilo que están buscando empleo, seguridad, educación y una vida mejor para sus familias. Solidaridad requiere preocupación preferencial a los pobres. Una prueba moral básica de cualquier sociedad es de cómo se trata a aquellos que son más vulnerables. Esta opción preferencial a los pobres y vulnerables incluye todos los que están marginados, niños no nacidos, las personas con discapacidad, ancianas, desahuciadas, víctimas de injusticia y opresión; y los inmigrantes.
