"Be Watchful! Be Alert!" - Mark 13:33

My dear parishioners,

Today we begin the season of Advent and a new liturgical year of the church. Advent is a time of hopeful and joyous anticipation. Advent, the word means "coming", celebrates in our time the unfolding graciousness and hospitality of God that should characterize us as followers of Christ.

The challenge of Advent for us (because it can be such a busy time) is to take the time to allow Christ to be born anew in our hearts. It is not a headlong drive toward an exhausting crash on Christmas day. The church invites us to an Advent of quiet reflection and awakening.

The color of Advent is a deep blue (violet) to characterize the joyful anticipation of Christ. We can expect the light of Christ to gradually claim our darkness, our longings, and our waiting until it reaches the full splendor of Christmas. The candles of our advent wreath are lit each week until the circle is complete.

We wait in joyful hope because God is ever faithful and true. God never abandons us. We belong to God... We the clay and God the potter as Isaiah tells us. So be watchful and alert. Look around you for Christ coming. Do not be found sleeping but watch with expectant eyes.

Our Advent Penance service is Thursday, December 14 beginning at 6:30pm. Many priests will be available for confessions to help us prepare the way of the Lord and to bring us peace and new grace. In December, the Catholic Charities collection and our Poor Box collection along with the Giving Tree project will allow us to share our Christmas giving with those in need. It is a time that will bring us ever closer to Christ. Let us prepare joyfully as we pray: Come Lord Jesus!

Feast of the Immaculate Conception



Our nation's patronal feast, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, is Friday, December 8th, a Holy Day of Obligation. The Immaculate Conception celebrates Mary's conception free from original sin in the womb of her mother, St. Anne.

Advent Wreath Prayers



If you are setting up an Advent wreath in your home this year, here are some prayers you could say while you light its candles. You may say these before or after a meal, when waking up, before going to bed, or whenever you and the members of your household gather for prayer. Before you say the prayer, read and talk over the Gospel you heard at Sunday Mass that week.

<u>Week 1:</u> O God, who asks us to be watchful and alert because we do not know when you will come, let this candle give us light and help us stay awake. At those times when we you ask us to act, give us strength to respond at once. Through Christ our Lord.

<u>Week 2:</u> O God, who sent John The Baptist to proclaim a baptism of repentance, let these two candles prepare the way for the Lord within us. Forgive our sins and fill us with your Holy Spirit. Make us ready to celebrate the birth of our Savior. Through Christ our Lord.

<u>Week 3:</u> O God, who sent John The Baptist as a voice crying out in the desert, open our ears to hear his message as we light the pink candle. Shape our lives so that they will become a straight path to you. Make us ready to greet your Son when he comes to us. Through Christ our Lord.

<u>Week 4:</u> O God, who sent your angel Gabriel to announce good news to Mary, make us happy with your word of life. Let our hearts be so filled with love for you that they glow with the lights of these four candles. May we live in a way that will please you. Through Christ our Lord.





Not familiar with how Fair Trade benefits the artisans involved?

Fair trade began as an alternative form of aid for developing countries where traditional charity was not enough. Fair trade creates self-sufficient, independent organizations that work towards long-term change and positive development. In many ways, fair trade partnerships allow artisans to feel more dignified than if they just received money from a charity organization. Fair trade places a real value on the skills and talents of the artisans, many of whom have been working on their craft for years and learned the skills from their parents or grandparents.

Unlike traditional charity, fair trade includes a social premium, on top of a fair wage, which goes to the community as a whole. Each cooperative then decides how to use the money for projects like clean water wells, new workshop facilities, a daycare facility, and other projects that will benefit the entire community.

Another advantage of fair trade over traditional charity is the fact that in working towards long-term development, fair trade provides steady, regular employment so that artisans have money coming in consistently. This regular income makes a big difference in the kind of livelihood the artisans can have for themselves and for their families. As fair trade organizations grow their partnerships, they also are able to provide educational resources like skill training, health care, financial planning, and more. These are extremely useful resources that traditional charity usually does not provide, but are crucial for the independent development of artisan communities. Thank you for shopping Fair Trade! Ps 147:1-6 Matthew 9:35 – 10:1,5a,6-8 As we prepare for Christmas, of course we're thinking about how to show fondness and appreciation to the special people in our lives by choosing gifts that will be meaningful

to them. And yet, assuming that we can actually find (or make) something that will be appreciated, will the gift really make a difference in the long run?

Since Christmas is the celebration of the birthday of Jesus, let's give him a gift, too – a long-lasting gift. But

what can we give to someone who already has everything? Or does he?

What gift can you give to Jesus that will have an eternal impact, a gift that no one else can give him, a gift he doesn't already have? Here's the answer: What have you been withholding from him?

Today's first reading reminds us that God is our Father. The responsorial Psalm asks the Father to help us turn to him. The second reading gives thanks to God for all that he has done for us. So – what gift can you give to God to express your appreciation for what he has given to you?

In the Gospel reading, we're reminded of the need to prepare – to actually do something that makes a difference – for the coming of Christ. This not only refers to his Second Coming; it's also about the day when he comes for us as we breathe our last earthly breaths. And it's about the way he wants to come to you

this Christmas. And it's about the way he is coming to you right now, today.

There's something new that he wants to give you. When he offers it, will he

find you doing what's right (as in the first reading)? Will he find you using your spiritual gifts (as in the second reading)? Will he find you alert and ready to do his bidding (as in the Gospel reading)?

Advent is an opportunity to take notice of the gifts he gives us and become

aware of the gifts we can give to him that he doesn't already have. It should make an eternal difference – for him and for us.

Reflect & Discuss:

- List the gifts that God has given to you. Then think about how much appreciation you have given to God for the gifts on that list. Do you know how much he appreciates your appreciation?
- Name ways that Jesus comes to us today.
- What will you do this Advent to become more aware of Jesus coming to you?
- + How will this make you more ready for Christmas?

December 12 - Our Lady of Guadalupe (1531). The Blessed Mother appeared as a Native American maiden to St. Juan Diego. She asked St. Juan to carry roses to the bishop as proof. When the roses were emptied from his tilma, it retained the image of the Blessed Mother.

December 15 - St. Maria di Rosa (1855). Born into a wealthy family in Brescia, Italy, Paula was renowned for holiness, generosity, and concern for the sick. She founded the Handmaids of Charity in 1840. She took the name Sr. Maria Crucifixa di Rosa.

December 27 - St. John the Beloved (1st Century). As an apostle and friend of Jesus, St. John was known for his fiery temper. Scholars believe he is the "beloved disciple" who sat by Jesus at the Last Supper in John's Gospel.

La segunda venida del Señor, realidad anunciada y esperada "La segunda venida del Señor, realidad anunciada y esperada en la fidelidad"

Comenzamos este domingo un nuevo año litúrgico, el tiempo de Adviento. Cada uno de nosotros tiene experiencia del transcurrir de los días, semanas y años. Vamos envejeciendo en el suceder de nuestra existencia. Experiencia que se puede vivir desde la fe o como un mero devenir del tiempo. Cuando no se vive de la fe este acontecer de cada persona y del mundo temporal, llegamos al final a un callejón sin salida, el del sin sentido de nuestra vida, ya que sólo vivimos y morimos. Desde la fe, en cambio, estos

hechos alcanzan un sentido nuevo. Conocemos que no sólo es un caminar en el tiempo, sino vivir siempre un presente y continuo *Kairós, el* momento particular de gracia que permite unirnos a nuestro Dios, realizar su providencia según nuestra vocación particular, abiertos también a los hermanos, orientándonos siempre a la meta de la Vida eterna con Dios.

El año litúrgico precisamente trata de darle un sentido nuevo al transcurso de días, semanas y años, no como mera repetición de hechos del pasado como si fuera un eterno retorno, sino invitándonos a tener "memoria" cada año actualizando los misterios que refieren a la salvación del hombre. Habíamos verificado el domingo pasado en la fiesta de Cristo Rey, que Él es alfa y omega, principio y fin, en la historia humana, en virtud de su humanidad. Como Hijo, en cambio, es presencia siempre viva en la eternidad trinitaria. Nosotros también comenzamos nuestro existir en el alfa-aunque estamos presentes desde siempre en el pensamiento del Dios providente- y nos orientamos al encuentro definitivo con quien es Omega.

El tiempo de adviento permite remitirnos al comienzo de la historia humana que en la promesa de un Salvador nos recobrará de la postración del pecado de los orígenes, y en su nacimiento actualizado de cada Navidad, nosproyecta a su segunda venida que es ya realidad en esperanza.

Por eso en la primera parte del tiempo litúrgico que comenzamos, la idea fuerte toca a la realidad anunciada, pero por realizar, de la segunda venida, a la que debemos prepararnos con espíritu vigilante ya que no conocemos niel día ni la hora de su acontecer como recuerda el evangelio de este día. Ya cercanos a la Navidad – en cambio- actualizaremos lo que se anuncia en la primera lectura (Is. 63,16b-17.19b; 64,2-7) cuando el pueblo de Israel reclamaba la venida del Mesías previendo la salvación de la misma historia. El texto de Isaías manifiesta el reproche dirigido a Dios ya que se pensaba que había abandonado a su pueblo endureciéndole incluso hasta el corazón. De hecho la Sagrada escritura habla de este endurecimiento, por ejemplo, refiriéndose al Faraón que se obstina en no dejar salir a los israelitas de Egipto o el hecho de que Dios deja a su suerte a los que no lo reconocen presente en las realidades creadas (Rom. 1, 18). En realidad, ante el rechazo obstinado de Dios por parte del hombre, muchas veces queda éste librado a su suerte, víctima de su propia elección, revestida de autosuficiencia.

Es entonces cuando descubre el ser humano sus errores y, arrepentido, se dirige a su Creador para que se abran los cielos y se derrame la salvación. La respuesta de Dios será la de venir a nuestro encuentro porque su gracia misericordiosa supera la presencia del pecado humano. El tiempo de Adviento, en fin, nos prepara a dar cumplimiento lo vivido el domingo pasado, el triunfo de Cristo como rey de todo lo creado.

Esto es así porque el nacimiento en carne del Hijo de Dios vence la envidia del demonio que nos hizo caer, mostrándonos que el ser pequeños como el Niño de Belén, nos eleva nuevamente a la dignidad de hijos adoptivos y, porque su segunda venida, manifiesta que todo es devuelto al Padre una vez que es puesto a los pies del Señor.

De allí la importancia de mirar desde el presente la segunda venida del Señor. Ese señor que se fue de viaje —como señala el evangelio- que ha dejado su casa, que es la humanidad, la Iglesia o la comunidad misma, a nuestro cuidado, dándonos tareas concretas a cada uno y advirtiendo al mismo tiempo, "¡tengan cuidado! ¡Estén prevenidos! ¡No se duerman!" ¿Por qué ésta exhortación? Porque cuando nos acostumbramos a vivir en el tiempo, en lo mundano de cada día, concluimos viviendo como si Dios no existiera y lo eternal no aparece en el horizonte del que se dice creyente. Las preocupaciones de cada día, las costumbres, las modas y las ideologías de turno, acaban con arrebatarnos la mirada y pensamiento en lo eterno como meta de nuestro caminar, adormeciéndonos con los pasatiempos delpresente sin esperar con gozo la venida del que siempre está viniendo. No creer, por tanto, que por ignorar el momento de su venida y comprobar su tardanza estamos libres de que llegue de improviso y nos sorprenda.

La exigencia será siempre la de la vigilancia, de quien espera su retorno. Hemos de preguntarnos acerca de cómo estoy viviendo cada día, ya que nosotros también hoy volvemos a sentir la experiencia que señala el profeta, el sentirnos agobiados por el pecado, mientras el Señor nos responde con palabras del apóstol San Pablo (1 Cor. 1,3-9) diciéndonos "Dios es fiel". Nosotros que somos tan sensibles ante la infidelidad y el engaño de la persona que amamos, sensibles ante la mentira de quien nos esconde algode suma importancia recordar que "¡Dios es fiel", no se desdice de sus promesas, de lo que ha pensado desde toda la eternidad y, por eso nos llama también a la fidelidad para con El, viviendo en comunión permanente con su Hijo hecho hombre – como lo recuerda el apóstol.

Se anuncia, por lo tanto, el que vivamos en comunión con Jesús mientras dure nuestra misión de "porteros" o "servidores" de su casa, de la humanidad, de la Iglesia y de la comunidad (Mc. 13, 33-37).

Para esta tarea muchas veces dificil no estamos solos, porque precisamente para vivir la fidelidad nos ha colmado de sus dones, regalándonos con lo mejor de Sí mismo. Como diciéndonos, no tienen excusa si ustedes no son fieles, ya que esto no es porque Dios falle, sino porque no sabemos responder a tanto amor recibido. El no responder a ese amor del que es fiel hace que vivamos confundidos, de allí que el ser humano no sepa muchas veces en el tiempo presente cómo obrar en lo que ha de ser un anticipo de la eternidad. Cuando no se camina por la vida en unión con el Señor, este transitar por el mundo pierde también su sentido. Por eso hermanos, vivamos este adviento con esperanza, como lo significamos con el verde de la corona de adviento, signo de la vida nueva que se nos ofrece. Ser Inmaculada no es un privilegio que sitúe a la Virgen María fuera de la historia, distante de nuestros aconteceres cotidianos, sino que es el punto de partida de una historia nueva, de una realidad emergente, de una capacidad renovada para asumir el proyecto de Dios, para cumplir el designio de amor que, desde la eternidad, abarca a toda la humanidad y a cada persona en concreto.

Con María Inmaculada comienza una esperanza fundada que nos asegura que el imperio del mal no es irremediable, que el peso del pecado no es invencible, que la noche oscura tendrá fin y que la sombra de la muerte no se cierne inexorable como un destino fatal. María nace toda santa, llena de gracia, abierta totalmente a la acción del Espíritu Santo, como nueva criatura de una humanidad que comienza a vislumbrar un destello de luz. La creación comienza con la luz. "Dijo Dios: "Exista la luz". Y la luz existió" (Gn 1,3). Dios separa la luz de la tiniebla. La luz es la realidad que guía toda la obra de la creación. El cielo, el mar, la tierra, las plantas, los astros, los peces, las aves, los animales, el hombre "nacen a la luz". La luz está estrechamente unida a la vida, y el hombre viene a la luz, busca la luz, camina en la luz, huye de las tinieblas, es hijo de la luz o del día, realiza las obras de la luz.


Hay una fuerte oposición entre las tinieblas, símbolo del pecado y de la muerte, y la luz, expresión de la salvación y la vida. Las tinieblas se identifican con la noche, el tiempo del delito, la angustia y el miedo. En la Biblia se desarrolla un vocabulario construido con el símbolo de la luz. Dios es "columna de fuego", "se revela y habla desde el rayo y el fuego", es "el que quita la luz a los enemigos de Israel", "hace resplandecer su rostro y concede la gracia y la paz". Los profetas recuerdan que el pueblo elegido debe "caminar en la luz" y "difundir la luz". En los libros sapienciales la luz es símbolo del bien, de la vida, de la felicidad. Las tinieblas son el símbolo del peligro, de la enfermedad, del dolor y de la muerte. En Jesucristo converge toda la densidad bíblica, simbólica y existencial, que encierra y evoca el término "luz". En su venida "nos visitará el sol que nace de lo alto, para iluminar a los que viven en tinieblas y en sombra de muerte" (Lc 1,78-79). Su destino consiste en ser "luz para alumbrar a las naciones" (Lc 2,32). Jesucristo es la "luz verdadera" (Jn 1,9). Él puede decir: "Yo soy la luz del mundo" (Jn 8,12). Los cristianos estamos invitados a "caminar en la luz" y a recordar lo que afirma San Pablo: "todos sois hijos de la luz e hijos del día" (1 Tes 5,5). Con la Concepción Inmaculada de la Virgen María amanece en la historia de la humanidad.




