MONTHLY SCRIPTURAL REFLECTION

"Lord, send out your Spirit, and renew the face of the earth." (Psalm 104) "for we know that things can change." (LS, 13)

Amidst the unfolding epidemic of the coronavirus, one seemingly bright spot is the ecological impact. As production of goods has slowed down and many have eliminated unnecessary travel there is a drastic reduction of air pollution and carbon emissions in certain areas. It is an indication that our actions do have a visible impact on our environment. It shows us that another world is possible.



And yet we know that these ecological benefits could be temporary if we return to business as usual once



COVID-19 begins to clear. That is unless we help steer things otherwise. Fr. Joshtrum Kureethadam, the Ecology Coordinator at the Vatican has written that "**The crisis of the present coronavirus could be an opportunity for a new beginning**...We need to make sure that the post coronavirus economy should be different and should resolutely follow the path of sustainability, equity, democratic participation, etc."

Yet how can we help create this new beginning? How can we allow this to be an Easter moment, where new life emerges from death?

To not return to business as usual requires a shift from our previous consumer obsession to one based on simplicity. For many of us, particularly in the Global North, COVID-19 has forced us to live more simply as we have stayed at home. There are stories of people finding creative ways to be with their kids, to reconnect with family and friends, to focus on home-cooked meals, and finding ways to support those most vulnerable in their communities. We can then reflect on, what new life has emerged during this time of darkness? And what is the invitation to continue to nurture this new life, even amidst the coronavirus? Can it be about realigning our lives by our relationships and not things? Can it be about living with "the conviction that 'less is more'" (LS 22)

Can we imagine what our role might be in shaping a new beginning, where our human and ecological values are at the center?

As we celebrate Easter, let us reflect on the ways that the Spirit is renewing the face of the earth, at this moment, at this time. As Fr. Joshtrum states, "It could be the occasion to launch a green, sustainable, circular and communitarian economy." Let us pray for the Easter grace to move forward with courage and creativity to help shape our lives and communities anew based on what really matters in life - our relationships with God, our loved ones, brothers and sisters around the globe, and all members of the earth community.

- 2. What is one Easter action you can do to concretely help create a new beginning for our communities in light of COVID-19?
